"The Rosa Parks Story" Rosa Parks, "The Mother of the Civil Rights Movement," is a symbol of freedom for the world. She was a woman of quiet courage, dignity, and determination. In this one-woman show, actress Joanna Maddox portrays her life story from her childhood days as a field hand. Rosa Parks' mother and maternal grandparents encouraged her from an early age to stand up for herself and to feel good about herself even though she was mistreated because of the color of her skin. On December 1, 1955, Rosa Parks refused to surrender her seat to a white male passenger and was arrested by the Montgomery Police. She was not attempting to start a movement. She was simply tired of the social injustice, and she did not think it was right for a woman to give up her seat for a man. Andres Lara

Leadership 'n' Life Series – "The Cuban Guy"

Inspirational speaker and author Andres Lara emigrated from Cuba at sixteen to start a new life in America with virtually nothing. Without his parents and in a foreign country, Andres supported himself through high school, exchanging his labor at restaurants for food. He used to painfully communicate with others with a few words in English and nonverbal messages. Insecure about his accent, Andres studied Personal Growth at Montclair State University in New Jersey to build his confidence and face his worst fear: speaking in front of others. Inspired by speakers Robert E. Criner, Dr. Robert Gilbert, Napoleon Hill, Dr. Maxwell Maltz, and Anthony Robbins, Andres began a mission to share his result-producing strategies in a powerful, provocative, and respectful manner with everyone. He has facilitated workshops for national conferences at prestigious institutions such as Harvard

University, Boston College, Saint Elm College, William Paterson, Montclair State University, and other non-profit organizations such as YWCA, NAACP, Urban League, etc. His presentation, "How To Move Forward When You Feel Like Quitting: Becoming Unstoppable," will touch on staying motivated during difficult times, turning setbacks into comebacks, moving forward when you feel like giving up, and inspiring the sleeping giant within you.

Austin Walkin' Cane

"Damn Fine Blues!" Original & classic delta blues featuring slide guitar and soulful vocals. A blues gumbo repertoire that can conjure up the ghosts of highway 61 & the Delta Blues experience. Austin "Walkin' Cane" is a blues singer, songwriter and slide guitarist that performs acoustic solo, duo and electric band sets. Walkin' Cane has traveled all over the world from New Orleans, Louisiana, to Belfort, France, and has acquired various blues/instrumentalist awards over the years.



Austin walked for ten years with a cane due to an arterial venous malformation at birth. While performing on Bourbon Street in New Orleans, a homeless man called out "Hey Walkin' Cane, got some spare change for a brother?!" Austin took the jibe as his nickname. "Walkin' Cane's" latest CD, "Murder of a Blues Singer," was inspired by an after-hour dinner conversation with blues legend Robert Jr. Lockwood. "The stories were flowing like the grease off our plates." 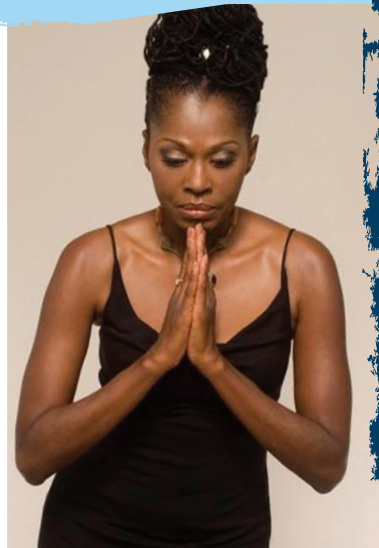


Truman

When Gavin DeGraw and Maroon 5 look in their rear-view mirrors, they likely see TRUMAN. The sibling duo—Ben and Chad Truman—flashes blue-eyed soul that blends influences from R&B legend Stevie Wonder, pop icon John Mayer and jazzy crooner Michael Buble. Truman won the campus-wide Battle of the Bands two years in a row at Brigham Young University behind Ben's melodic hooks and Chad's mood-altering chords—gifts they partially inherited from father Dan Truman, keyboard player for the award-winning group Diamond Rio. With a sound BMI describes as "smooth" and "mature," the Truman show has played to audiences of more than 13,000, sharing the stage with such artists as Kelly Clarkson and Ryan Shupe & the Rubberband. Raised in Nashville, Tennessee, the brothers have embraced Music City's catchphrase, "It all begins with a song." When you listen, you discover Truman's music is all at once a classic. mZuri Moyo

"The Fannie Lou Hamer Story" - In celebration of Women's History Month, mZuri Moyo portrays Fannie Lou Hamer in this one-woman powerful musical performance. Born into Mississippi sharecropping poverty at the beginning of the last century, Hamer fought a turbulent fight in the 1960's promoting voter registration with the student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, and her deep commitment to grass-roots anti-poverty projects made her a central figure in the civil rights movement. Hamer's eloquence as a spokeswoman for the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party and her telling the story of a horrific beating she endured at the hands of jailers before the Credentials Committees of the 1964 Democratic Convention brought her to national attention and eventually succeeded in electing many African American to national office in Mississippi. Everything you wanted to know about Graduation, but didn't know who to ask...

Let's start with a few definitions:

Graduation: The completion of all requirements necessary for your academic program.

Commencement: The formal ceremony at which degrees or certificates are conferred, held at the end of spring term.

Honors: Graduating with an all-college cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.5-3.74.

High Honors: Graduating with an all-college cumulative GPA of 3.75 or higher. Since the commencement program is printed before spring term grades are recorded, honor graduates are identified based on their GPA at the beginning of spring term.

Rehearsal: Forget it; we don't have one!

Now the basic facts:

When: College Credit Commencement is May 8. Information about when to report for the ceremonies and how to confirm your attendance will be mailed to graduates' homes in early April.

Where: Jacksonville Veterans' Memorial Arena

Who: Anyone may participate who has graduated at the end of Summer Term '09, Fall Term '09 or Spring Term '10.

Caps and Gowns: Available for purchase in your campus bookstore in April.

Graduation Announcements: Available from the campus bookstore in March. Neither announcements nor tickets are required for admission to the arena. Your family and friends are welcome to attend the ceremony.

Graduation Photos: Official photographers will take your picture as you cross the stage, and a proof will be mailed to you. Photo purchase information will be included with the proof if you wish to buy copies.
