
Clubs and Organizations

Inspirational speaker and author Andres Lara emigrated from Cuba at sixteen to start a new life in America with virtually nothing. Without his parents and in a foreign country, Andres supported himself through high school, exchanging his labor at restaurants for food. He used to painfully communicate with others with a few words in English and nonverbal messages. Insecure about his accent, Andres studied Personal Growth at Montclair State University in New Jersey to build his confidence and face his worst fear: speaking in front of others. Inspired by speakers Robert E. Criner, Dr. Robert Gilbert, Napoleon Hill, Dr. Maxwell Maltz, and Anthony Robbins, Andres began a mission to share his result-producing strategies in a powerful, provocative, and respectful manner with everyone. Doug Wood Master Musician

Since his days of performing in the Boston subways in the early 1990’s, Doug Wood has earned the status as one of the premier independent acoustic musicians in the country. Doug was voted by campuses nationwide as the “Best Instrumentalist” (CampusAwards.com) and “2005 Best Music Performance” finalist (Campus Activities Magazine). Doug was most recently nominated for “2007 BEST GUITARIST” by the Cleveland Free Times, and 2008 “Best Of” in the Acoustic Category by Colorado Public Radio. Doug’s song “Desert Song” was just nominated for the JUST PLAIN FOLKS “Best New Age” Song. JUST PLAIN FOLKS reviewed over 500,000 songs worldwide.



Doug’s instrumental music can shift from a sweet solo finger-style guitar piece to a composition looping energetic world rhythms with various percussion instruments. He connects well with his audience, whether it’s through his musicianship, tales of the road, or simply his wry sense of humor.

Doug has appeared live on National Public Radio shows “Echoes” and “River City Folk,” Public Television’s arts program “Applause,” and his CDs have been featured on over 700 stations nationwide. “Damn Fine Blues!” Original & classic delta blues featuring slide guitar and soulful vocals. A blues gumbo repertoire that can conjure up the ghosts of highway 61 & the Delta Blues experience. Austin “Walkin’ Cane” is a blues singer, songwriter and slide guitarist that performs acoustic solo, duo and electric band sets. Walkin’ Cane has traveled all over the world from New Orleans, Louisiana, to Belfort, France, and has acquired various blues/instrumentalist awards over the years. Austin walked for ten years with a cane due to an arterial venous malformation at birth. Truman Music

When Gavin DeGraw and Maroon 5 look in their rear-view mirrors, they likely see TRUMAN. The sibling duo—Ben and Chad Truman—flashes blue-eyed soul that blends influences from R&B legend Stevie Wonder, pop icon John Mayer and jazzy crooner Michael Buble. Truman won the campus-wide Battle of the Bands two years in a row at Brigham Young University behind Ben’s melodic hooks and Chad’s mood-altering chords—gifts they partially inherited from father Dan Truman, keyboard player for the award-winning group Diamond Rio. With a sound BMI describes as “smooth” and “mature,” the Truman show has played to audiences of more than 13,000, sharing the stage with such artists as Kelly Clarkson and Ryan Shupe & the Rubberband. Raised in Nashville, Tennessee, the brothers have embraced Music City’s catchphrase, “It all begins with a song.” When you listen, you discover Truman’s music is all at once a classic. Rosa Parks, “The Mother of the Civil Rights Movement,” is a symbol of freedom for the world. She was a woman of quiet courage, dignity, and determination. In this one-woman show, actress Joanna Maddox portrays her life story from her childhood days as a field hand. Rosa Parks’ mother and maternal grandparents encouraged her from an early age to stand up for herself and to feel good about herself even though she was mistreated because of the color of her skin. On December 1, 1955, Rosa Parks refused to surrender her seat to a white male passenger and was arrested by the Montgomery Police. She was not attempting to start a movement. She was simply tired of the social injustice, and she did not think it was right for a woman to give up her seat for a man. Nurse Without Boundaries

Can one person possibly make a difference in a world filled with chaos? YES, after working sixteen years in emergency rooms throughout the United States, Mary Lightfine, a nurse, pilot and a self-professed adrenaline junkie, packed her bags and moved from New Straitsville, Ohio, to Mogadishu, Somalia. This decision gave her a chance to feel what war, starvation and desperation was like from completely different perspective that changed her life forever. During the past twelve years she has lived and worked in more than a dozen countries, including some of the most hellish spots on earth. Mary was ambushed and shot at in Somalia, delivered babies in the jungles of Sri Lanka, and traveled by jeep, foot and donkey in perilous Afghani Mountains full of land mines-- to help isolated inhabitants. Mary brought food to remote villages by helicopter in Nicaragua and to starving refugees in South Sudan following the destruction of their villages by government alliances. She was one of the first to provide medical aid to Kosovar refugees who had experienced unthinkable horrors. Mary is a seasoned veteran of the Nobel Prize winning organization, Doctors Without Borders. She is also founder and President of Volunteers Without Boundaries. Everything you wanted to know about Graduation, but didn't know who to ask...

Let's start with a few definitions:

Graduation: The completion of all requirements necessary for your academic program.

Commencement: The formal ceremony at which degrees or certificates are conferred, held at the end of spring term.

BS/BAS

Cum Laude: Graduating with an all-college cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.5-3.64.

Magna Cum Laude: Graduating with an all-college cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.65-3.79.

Summa Cum Laude: Graduating with an all-college cumulative GPA of 3.80 or higher. Since the commencement program is printed before spring term grades are recorded, honor graduates are identified based on their GPA at the beginning of spring term.

AA/AS

Honors: Graduating with an all-college cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.5-3.74.

High Honors: Graduating with an all-college cumulative GPA of 3.75 or higher. Since the commencement program is printed before spring term grades are recorded, honor graduates are identified based on their GPA at the beginning of spring term.

Rehearsal: Forget it; we don't have one!

When: College Credit Commencement is May 7. Information about when to report for the ceremonies and how to confirm your attendance will be mailed to graduates' homes in early April.

Where: Jacksonville Veterans' Memorial Arena

Who: Anyone may participate who has graduated at the end of Summer Term '10, Fall Term '10 or Spring Term '11.

Caps and Gowns: Available for purchase in your campus bookstore in April.

Graduation Announcements: Available from the campus bookstore in March. Neither announcements nor tickets are required for admission to the arena. Your family and friends are welcome to attend the ceremony.

Graduation Photos: Official photographers will take your picture as you cross the stage, and a proof will be mailed to you. Photo purchase information will be included with the proof if you wish to buy copies.
