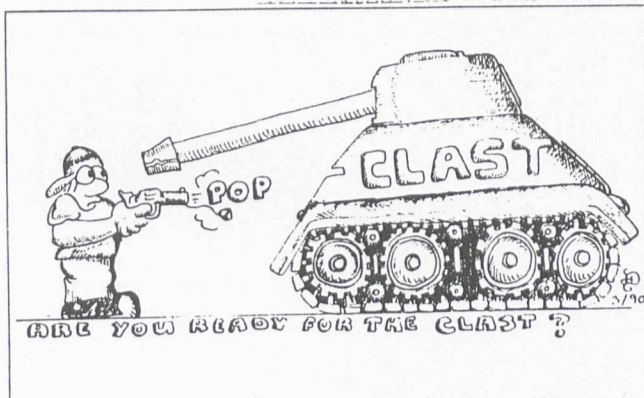
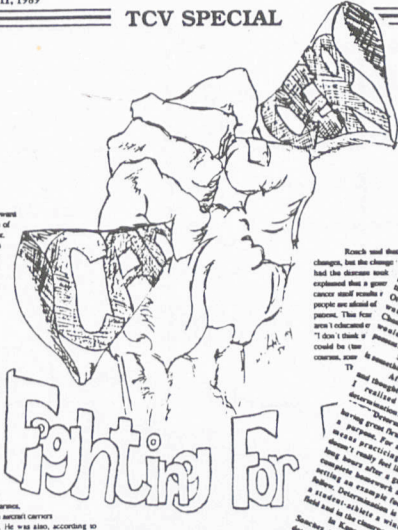
"The November, Howard 'Larry' Jarvis died at the age of 68 from cancer. Jarvis' son, Reggie, is an FCCJ student and, although he remembers the passing of his father was no surprise, it is the kind of event one is never really fully prepared for."

In the early 1980s, the older Jarvis began finding pain in his leg that attributed to a "dreaded knee operation" he had undergone years before and his son, finally going to a doctor in 1986, received the diagnosis.

When he found out, it was too advanced for him to do anything, said Jarvis, although he later had surgery.

Jarvis' father had been a small business for the U.S. Marine, having served for 22 years on several carriers and in American embassies. He was also, according to Jarvis, a man "who loved getting on his hands and knees and playing with kids."

"The great consolation, which made it a bit easier on the family," said Jarvis, adding that his father's attitude was good partly because he denied the existence of the disease. "I had to get out back to really do anything, he said."



Men's basketball team wins first FCCJ classic; avenges earlier loss to Gulf Coast

The Florida Community College at Jacksonville men's basketball team won its first FCCJ classic on Saturday, avenging a 71-67 loss to Gulf Coast Community College in the semifinals of the tournament.

The team, coached by Coach [Name], defeated Gulf Coast 78-71 in the final game of the classic. The game was a hard-fought battle, with both teams trading leads throughout the contest.

The victory marks a significant milestone for the team, as it is their first win in the FCCJ classic since its inception. The team will now advance to the championship game of the tournament.

The Florida Community College at Jacksonville men's golf team won the Gator Bowl tournament, held at the University of North Florida, on Saturday.

MISS FCCJ PAGEANT

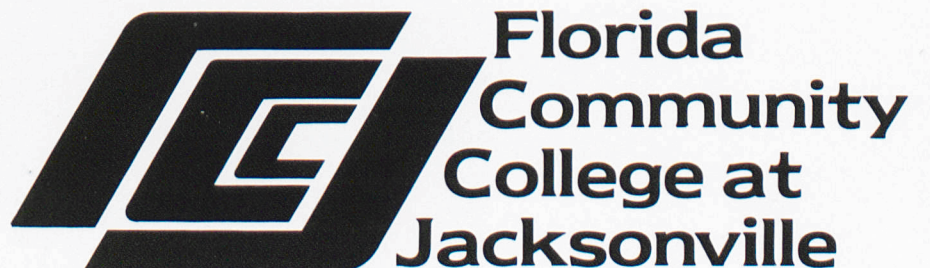
