



FSCJ receives Multi-Year Talent Search grants from the U.S. Department of Education

Florida State College at Jacksonville (FSCJ) was recently awarded two \$1.2 million, five-year Talent Search grants from the U.S. Department of Education to promote postsecondary education access and equity for low-income, first-generation college students.

The first grant is a renewal for FSCJ's South Campus Talent Search program which has been in operation since 2007 to benefit students at Englewood, Terry Parker and Samuel W. Wolfson high schools, and Alfred I. DuPont, Fort Caroline and Southside middle schools. Each year, the program has served 500 students with the expressed potential to succeed in higher education. From 2013-15, 73 percent of the Talent Search graduates enrolled in a program of postsecondary education.

Karen Zelaya, a 2013 FSCJ graduate and participant in the Talent Search program as an Englewood High School student, said, "As the first person in my family to attend college, I didn't have access to anyone with experience who could give me their insights and advice as I applied to college. The Talent Search program provided me with a view from 'inside,' helped me learn what opportunities and resources were available and allowed me to develop valuable skills that simplified the entire process."

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2017 Benefits Open Enrollment The second grant allows FSCJ to build on the program's success and multiply its impact for inner city students from Andrew Jackson, William M. Raines, A. Philip Randolph and Jean Ribault high schools. FSCJ's Downtown Campus will now have the resources to provide support for students in an area of Jacksonville where the poverty rates are highest and educational attainment rates are lowest.

"Students in Jacksonville's Urban Core are in need of support to help change their circumstances and the trajectory of their future," said Downtown Campus President Dr. Marie Gnage. "We have seen such tremendous results for students on Jacksonville's Southside since the program was implemented there, and we are eager to see similar impact for students living in downtown Jacksonville."

Talent Search's range of services provides students with a customized and comprehensive menu of options based on their changing and individualized

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needs. Resources designed to remove barriers to success include tutoring and study skills, student-specific success plans, an online peer-to-peer support network, group workshops for college and career exploration, time management skills, test taking strategies and college entrance exam preparation, financial aid assistance, scholarship identification support, financial literacy for both the students and their families, academic advising, college tours, admission application support and various other social and cultural activities.

The project aims to meet the following objectives:

- Increase the percentage of non-senior participants who complete the current academic year and continue their education at the next grade level.
- Increase the percentage of seniors served who graduate within the standard number of years.
- Increase the percentage of students who graduate within the standard number of years from a rigorous secondary school program of study.
- Increase the percentage of students who enroll in an institution of higher education by the fall semester immediately following high school graduation.
- Increase the percentage of students who complete a postsecondary education program within six years of graduation from high school.

"The Talent Search program will bolster our efforts to increase both academic and school culture measures for students in poverty stricken areas of Jacksonville," said Assistant Superintendent over the Duval Transformation Region of Duval County Public Schools Iranetta Wright. "I am encouraged by the opportunity and support the program promises to deliver for our community's future."

FSCJ Dedicates Dr. Lois D. Gibson Building



The College recently named North Campus Building A the Dr. Lois D. Gibson Building after longtime nursing professional, educator and philanthropist. At the September 13 District Board of Trustees meeting, the decision was made to embed Dr. Lois Davis Gibson's legacy within FSCJ in perpetuity by renaming the building in her honor.

Dedicating more than 40 years of her life to nursing, Dr. Gibson began her career as a staff and operating room nurse at Duval Medical Center in Jacksonville. In 1968, Dr. Gibson joined Florida Junior College, which is now known as FSCJ, as a nursing instructor and coordinator and was later named Director of Nursing in 1976. She also served as the Dean of Health Services

from 1986 until her retirement three years later.

Among her many contributions, Dr. Gibson led the processes resulting in accreditation of FSCJ's associate in nursing degree by the National League for Nursing and a \$3 million grant to construct the nursing building on North Campus.

Prior to her passing in 2015, she established the Dr. Lois Gibson Book Scholarship fund which is awarded annually to an African-American student in the associate in nursing program with demonstrated financial need and the drive to succeed in their future in nursing.

"We are eternally grateful to Dr. Gibson for her personal and professional contributions to FSCJ and the nursing profession," said FSCJ President Dr. Cynthia Bioteau. "We are delighted to honor her through naming the allied health building that will produce future professionals in health care."

FSCJ Promotes Collegewide Political Engagement

Florida State College at Jacksonville is committed to encouraging and stimulating Collegewide political involvement during the current election season. The recently released National Study of Learning, Voting and Engagement (NSLVE) conducted by Tufts University's Jonathan M. Tisch College of Civic Life found that in the 2012 Presidential Election, 60% of FSCJ's student population voted, and 31% participated in the 2014 Midterm Election. While the data shows that our students demonstrated more engagement than most of the other institutions with the Carnegie classification, there is still room for growth.

To increase voter registration, representatives from the Supervisor of Elections' office are regularly visiting each campus to promote and facilitate registration among not only our students, but also our faculty and staff. Representatives from different political parties have been invited to share information at each of the campuses as well. In addition to these site visits, FSCJ is also promoting Turbovote.com, which is an online resource for voter registration and updates, election reminders and absentee ballot application.

Prior to the August 30 primaries, our Student Government Association (SGA) hosted a Republican Primary Debate for Florida's 4th Congressional District in which five of the candidates discussed topics that directly affect the College, our students and the community. Based on the engagement and positive feedback, FSCJ is pursuing the opportunity to host a debate for the general election as well.

Vice President of Student Services Dr. Chris Holland, Director of Government and Community Engagement Jen Silva and FSCJ's General Counsel Colin Mailloux, along with select faculty members, are working to connect members of the SGA with the 2017-18 Florida Constitution Review Commission to provide their insights, specifically in areas as they pertain to higher education.

On September 14, Circuit Judge for the 4th Judicial Circuit Adrian G. Soud hosted the 8th Annual Constitution Awareness Day at South Campus. Judge Soud guided students, faculty, staff and interested participants from the community through the U.S. Constitution and its interpretation in today's judicial system.

"In the spirit of creating an atmosphere of comprehensive, bipartisan educational experiences and opportunities, it is our responsibility as an institution of higher learning to provide access to objective information and resources," said Director of Government and Community Engagement Jen Silva. "It is our goal that these efforts will prepare our College community as they head to the polls and make decisions that will directly impact their future."

Board Highlights

Following are the highlights of the September 13, 2016 meeting of the FSCJ District Board of Trustees:

- The District Board of Trustees approved the successor Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) between the College and the United Faculty of Florida-Florida State College at Jacksonville ("Union") effective August 16, 2016 through August 15, 2019, as ratified by the faculty.
- The District Board of Trustees approved a 2% salary increase calculated on base salaray as of May 1, 2016 for all eligible full-time non-faculty employees. Employees serving in a full time position as of May 1, 2016 and continuing in a full time position since that date are eligible for the increase, to be effective September 16, 2016.
- The District Board of Trustees authorized College administration to negotiate and enter into resultant contract(s) for grant proposal number A17001, Carl D. Perkins, Career and Technical Education Postsecondary Programs, Section 132. The purpose of this program is to more fully develop the academic and career and technical skills of postsecondary education students who elect to enroll in Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs.
- The District Board of Trustees authorized College administration to negotiate and enter into resultant contract(s) for grant proposal number A17003, Adult General Education. Under this grant the College is able to assist adults in completing high school or the equivalent by providing educational services including Adult Basic Education (ABE), Adult High School (AHS), High School Equivalency (HSE) and English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) programs.
- The District Board of Trustees authorized College administration to negotiate and enter into resultant contract(s) for grant proposal number Q16001, Quick Response Training: Digital Risk LLC. The Quick Response Training (QRT) grant consists of state funds provided by Workforce Florida Inc. for customized training to new or expanding companies in the state of Florida.
- The District Board of Trustees approved insurance benefit premiums, continuation of current contracts with Florida Blue, Delta Dental for dental insurance, continuation of vision insurance with Humana/CompBenefits, and The Hartford for life insurance for the period of January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017 (Plan Year).

2016-17 Faculty Award Winners Announced

Congratulations to the four faculty award winners for the 2016-17 academic year. For the first time, student evaluators were included in the selection process, as they served alongside faculty in selecting the following honorees:

Shawna Coram, M.A. (Professor of Business and Accounting; School of Business, Professional Studies and Public Safety) has been recognized with the Innovative Faculty Technology Award. Her pedagogy stands out for the variety of tech tools she has integrated into her teaching, including Blendspace lessons, Kahoot, Poll Everywhere, Remind.com, Jing, SnagIt, YouTube, Educreations, iMovie, Kaltura and commercially produced shows (CNBC's The Profit) that add an applied dimension to course content. Student support for her work stands out not only for their praise of her class structure, but because of the personal touch that underlies her approach.

Rebecca Levy, M.F.A. (Professor of Dance; School of Liberal Arts, Communication and Education) has been recognized with an Outstanding Faculty Award. Highlights of her nomination included strong relationships she builds with her students, with an emphasis on transition to life beyond FSCJ, including her work in co-founding the Jacksonville Dance Theatre in response to the absence of professional opportunities for local dancers. Professor Levy is also the director of danceWORKS, FSCJ's repertoire company, which, in addition to performing at FSCJ throughout the year, performs locally at a variety of community outlets.

Lourdes Norman, Ph. D. (Professor of Biological Sciences; School of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) has been recognized with an Outstanding Faculty Award. Highlights of her nomination included evidence of her ability to meaningfully engage and inspire students in rigorous science classes connected to career pathways, her emphasis on hands-on, technology-enhanced learning in which students can see and interact with subjects about which they are learning, as well as a number of achievements in curriculum and external funding.

Susan Reilly, Ph. D. (Professor of Economics; School of Social, Behavioral and Health Sciences) has been recognized with an Outstanding Faculty Award. Highlights of her nomination included her strong leadership of the Social and Behavioral Science Council, her work in establishing and maintaining FSCJ's Center for Economic and Financial Education and her strong connection with students both in and beyond the classroom, including her active Twitter presence.

FSCJ's Engineering Technology (Advanced Manufacturing) Associate in Science

FSCJ offers this hands-on Associate in Science (A.S.) degree in Engineering Technology (Advanced Manufacturing) for students interested in pursuing careers involving installation, repair and maintenance of industrial and manufacturing environments. It is designed to respond to the needs of industrial and regional businesses and equips our students with manufacturing-related technical skills for the industry. As of today, 98 FSCJ graduates have secured manufacturing jobs upon completing the program.

Students enrolled in the program learn about robotics, hydraulics, welding, advanced machining and more. For the 2016-17 academic year, 146 students have applied to study in our A.S. in Engineering Technology program.

In addition to earning an A.S. degree, students are able to earn four technical certificates including:

- CNC Machinist/Fabricator
- Engineering Technology Support Specialist
- · Pneumatics, Hydraulics and Motors for Manufacturing
- Mechatronics

Through industry partnerships with companies such as Johnson & Johnson Vision (Vistakon), Gerdau Ameristeel and Anheuser-Busch Companies LLC, students are able to gain internship experience to supplement their studies. Currently, FSCJ is working with Fleet Readiness Center Southeast to build a technical certificate that incorporates 30 credit hours of classes needed for our students to obtain jobs with its company.

The Engineering Technology program is not only working to ensure graduates are prepared to enter the workforce, but also offers high school students the chance to get a head start on their degree. This Fall Term, the program is working with Englewood High School to begin dual enrollment opportunities for interested students. The program will also offer a summer camp for other high schools in our service area to introduce students to the fast-growing engineering industry.


Alumni Spotlight
