JaxbyJax began at 2 p.m. at Il Desco Italian Restaurant with nine student writers chosen by FSCJ English Professor Matthew Lany for the first JaxbyJax Student Showcase. FSCJ professors Sarah Stuart and Jennifer Chase organized the JaxbyJax stations.

JaxbyJax culminated with an after party and book market from 6:30 to 9 p.m. at CoRK Arts District, "Corner of Rosselle and King" Streets.

#### **TEDxFSCJ: Engage**

On November 5, FSCJ's Downtown Campus hosted the College's third annual TEDxFSCJ event, a day-long conference featuring nine local speakers. This year's event was themed ENGAGE and aimed to engage the audience – a mix of students, faculty, staff and community members – with different issues, ideas and communities.

More than 150 people heard TED talks on topics ranging from destignatizing the mentally ill to the struggles of raising a Muslim-American daughter in today's America. TEDxFSCJ concluded with the opportunity for attendees to chalk messages of positivity on the Downtown Campus sidewalks. The recorded event and talks are expected to be available for viewing on <u>tedxfscj.com</u> by mid-December.

#### **International Observe the Moon Night**

The NASA International Observe the Moon Night was held at FSCJ's North Campus on Saturday, November 5, after being rescheduled due to Hurricane Matthew.

More than 150 people attended the session, seeing the "peak-a-boo" first quarter Moon as clouds came and went. Not only were a number of students and FSCJ staff on hand, it truly was a family night, as a number of families attended the event.

Approximately 100 of the attendees enjoyed a short program about the Moon to learn more. Many even stayed around to ask questions, such as "what is a blue moon," (the second full moon in a calendar month) and "why do we see eclipses," (because of the sun-earth-moon alignments during the moon's orbit around earth).

#### **College Goal Sunday**

Florida State College at Jacksonville (FSCJ) hosted College Goal Sunday on November 6 at the Downtown Campus Advanced Technology Center and Nassau Center. More than 180 people received free financial literacy guidance as well as assistance in completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Additionally, more than \$20,000 in scholarships were awarded to registered event attendees.

#### North Campus Hosts Zika Virus Quarterly Health Series Presentation



The School of Social, Behavioral and Health Sciences launched its first Quarterly Health Series at North Campus with Dr. Mobeen Rathore's presentation on the Zika virus. Dr. Rathore is the hospital epidemiologist and chief of infectious diseases and immunology at Wolfson Children's Hospital.

Dr. Rathore, who also serves as professor and founding director of the University of Florida Center for HIV/AIDS Research and Education (UF CARES), provided the history of the Zika virus during last month's event. He surprised many audience members by stating that the illness, previously thought to be a recent development, originally surfaced in 1947.

Dr. Rathore also discussed how the Zika virus is transmitted, signs and symptoms, the definition of microcephaly, how individuals can decrease their risk of contracting the virus and the current work being conducted for a vaccine along with the concerns surrounding this solution.

The audience took advantage of the opportunity to ask Dr. Rathore questions about the virus. He is actively involved in Zika virus research and has received more than \$60 million in funding for research and program development.

"This was a very informative session and we look forward to continuing our Quarterly Health Series and having discussions on other important health topics," said Academic Director of Health Sciences Dr. Monica Franklin.

#### <u>Judge Karen Mills-Francis Leads Domestic Abuse Forum</u>

Judge Karen Mills-Francis recently visited Downtown Campus to lead a forum on relationships, domestic/spousal and dating abuse. The School of Social, Behavioral and Health Sciences partnered with Executive Chair for the School of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics/Downtown Campus President Dr. Marie Gnage to host the event.

During the discussion, Judge Mills-Francis shared with female students her personal story of being a domestic violence survivor. She aimed to make clear that domestic violence occurs in all races and socioeconomic levels. The forum provided many students with a safe place to discuss their own difficult ordeals.

Judge Mills-Francis currently presides over "Supreme Justice with Judge Karen" and boasts more than 13 years of legal experience. Driven by the lack of diversity in the court system, she ran for a judgeship in 2000, winning her first election and becoming the second black woman to serve on the bench in Miami-Dade County, Florida.

After twice being elected to the position of Miami-Dade County Judge, Judge Mills-Francis made it her mission to support those who are at risk of getting lost in the legal system. In April 2008, Judge Mills-Francis stepped down in order to bring her passion for law and desire to help others into homes across America.



Professor of Medical Assisting Karen Kelley stated that she and her students were appreciative of this forum opportunity and later continued the discussion in their classroom. Kendra Mervin, TRIO student support services project director for North Campus, also stated that the conversation continued during a late lunch following the event. Dr. Sandy Robinson, executive chair for the School of Social, Behavioral and Health Sciences/North Campus president, hopes to further develop safe spaces for students to continue these types of discussions.

#### **JAXPORT CEO Brian Taylor Inspires FSCJ Logistics Students**



"Don't be afraid to start at the bottom," said Brian Taylor, chief executive officer of the Jacksonville Port Authority (JAXPORT), as he spoke last month to students enrolled in the College's transportation and logistics programs. "That's where you learn. That's where you grow."

On October 11, Taylor addressed approximately 50 students at the Downtown Campus Advanced Technology Center. During his talk, Taylor shared his four attributes that define success: passion, humility, the ability to tolerate uncertainty and people skills.

The CEO also discussed topics including JAXPORT's role in the supply chain industry, the latest updates regarding port

growth projects and the employment outlook for Northeast Florida's transportation and logistics sector. Taylor stressed to students the importance of building both a plan as well as a backup plan, thinking ahead and developing leadership skills.

Executive Chair for the School of Business, Professional Studies and Public Safety/Kent Campus President Dr. Cedrick Gibson and Executive Chair for the School of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics/Downtown Campus President Dr. Marie Gnage joined the College's logistics and transportation faculty in thanking Taylor for inspiring our student professionals.

<u>Initiative Supporting Strategic Plan Goal #5: Cultivate Institutional Efficiency and Effectiveness</u>

• At the Nexus of Institutional Improvement: Enhancing the Inter-Related Processes of Curriculum, Financial Aid, and Accreditation

This supporting initiative seeks to improve the inter-related processes of curriculum, financial aid, and accreditation, specifically where they intersect. Representatives from each of the participating FSCJ offices traveled to Valencia and Santa Fe College, both Florida College System "Gold" Schools and Aspen Prize winners, to discuss best practices in these areas. Based on their findings, participants are in the process of implementing improvements that include revisions to the College's curriculum proposal forms and SACSCOC substantive change practices.

In addition, this supporting initiative will develop training for deans, instructional program managers, faculty, and others throughout the College who regularly interact with the curriculum process and, by extension, the processes of financial aid and accreditation. The training will instruct participants how to effectively navigate the curriculum process and to recognize curricular impacts on financial aid and accreditation.

#### **Mathew Coban, Class of 2016**

Matt graduated from Florida State College at Jacksonville (FSCJ) with a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) in Biomedical Sciences and an Associate in Science (A.S.) in Biotechnology Laboratory Technology. Today, he works in the Department of Cancer Biology on in-vitro ovarian cancer experimentation at the Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville. His primary project is to elucidate the role of hormones and cytokines in initiation, survival and progression of ovarian carcinomas via gene regulation and subsequent phenotypic modifications.

Matt says his favorite memory from FSCJ is graduating with his girlfriend, who is also a biomedical sciences graduate. He was selected for an internship at the Mayo Clinic as part of the Biotechnology Laboratory A.S. program. Matt was hired when the internship concluded. Now, after graduating from the Biomedical Sciences B.S. program, his position is being upgraded once again. "FSCJ supplied me with the opportunity to work at one of the best institutes in the world for my field of research," he said.

Matt encourages those who currently study at FSCJ to take advantage of the helpful professors and affordable tuition that the College offers.

"The professors care about your success," he says. "You will get a good education if you are willing to put in the effort, and afterwards, you can go on to a great graduate or professional school or work for great companies, no matter where your undergraduate degree comes from."

#### **Class of 2015 Graduate Excels in the Paralegal Field**

Paralegal Studies graduate Kevin Stevens says he has always been interested in the legal profession. After earning his Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in History from Wabash College in 2011, he spent two years teaching for Duval County Public Schools. Kevin felt the need for a career change and began considering other opportunities.

"I started looking at what FSCJ had to offer and the paralegal program stood out," Kevin said. "Once I saw that FSCJ offered an associate degree in paralegal studies, it pretty much sealed the deal." He credits Professors Nancy Sutton, Faith Litvack, Nick Martino and Paul McClester with helping him succeed in the program.

After enrolling in the College's paralegal studies program in 2014, he became good friends with fellow student Sarah Franken. The following spring, Sarah, who worked at Constangy Brooks, Smith and Prophete, LLC, informed Kevin of a data clerk opening at the law firm.



"I was stunned and thankful that she thought of me," said Kevin. "I never would have thought that this would be how I got my proverbial foot in the door."

Kevin applied for the position and was hired. He expressed gratitude for his friend Sarah helping him to advance in his career. Upon his completion of the paralegal studies program in 2015, Kevin was promoted from part-time data clerk to his current role of full-time paralegal.

Kevin considers the program a good stepping stone for those wanting to pursue a career in law. For students interested in FSCJ's A.S. in Paralegal Studies, he offers a few words of advice.

"Think of the legal world as just that: a world," he said. "It's vast and will have something of interest for you. It is an opportunity to see how everything works from a legal perspective."

In the future, Kevin plans to work in the paralegal field for a few years before transitioning to law school to become an attorney. We are proud of Kevin's success in the paralegal studies program and wish him continued success in his professional endeavors.
