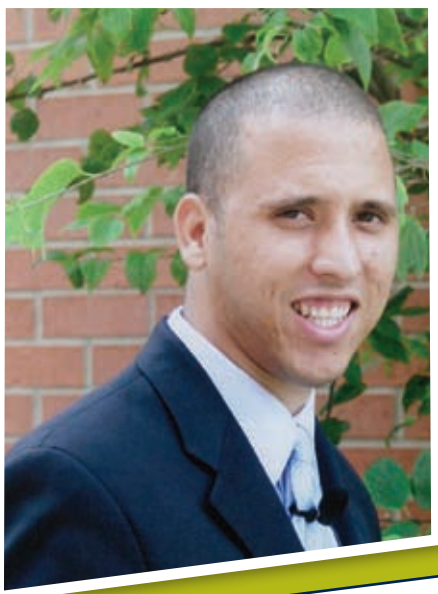

Andres Lara – The Cuban Guy

Inspirational speaker and author Andres Lara emigrated from Cuba at sixteen to start a new life in America with virtually nothing. Without his parents in a foreign country, Andres supported himself through high school exchanging his labor at restaurants for food. He used to painfully communicate with others with a few words in English and nonverbal messages. Insecure about his accent, Andres studied Personal Growth at Montclair State University in New Jersey to build his



confidence and face his worst fear- speaking in front of others. Inspired by speakers Robert E. Criner, Dr. Robert Gilbert, Napoleon Hill, Dr. Maxwell Maltz, and Anthony Robbins, Andres began a mission to share his result-producing strategies in a powerful, provocative, and respectful manner with everyone. He has facilitated workshops for national conferences at prestigious institutions such as Harvard University, Boston College, Saint Elm College, William Paterson, Montclair State University, and other non-profit organizations such as YWCA, NAACP, Urban League, etc. The kickoff to our Spring Leadership 'n' Life Series, his presentation, How To Move Forward When You Feel Like Quitting: Becoming Unstoppable, will touch on staying motivated during difficult times, turning setbacks into comebacks, moving forward when you feel like giving up, and inspiring the sleeping giant within you.

Austin "Walkin'" Cane Blues

"Damn Fine Blues!" Original and classic delta blues featuring slide guitar and baritone vocals. With a blues gumbo repertoire that blends in jazz, folk, soul, and rock 'n' roll, Austin "Walkin' Cane" is a blues singer, songwriter and slide guitarist that performs acoustic solo, duo and electric band sets. Walkin' Cane has traveled all over the country from New Orleans, Louisiana, to Juneau, Alaska, and has acquired various blues/instrumentalist awards over the years. Austin walked for ten years with a cane due to an arterial venous malformation at birth. While performing on Bourbon Street in New Orleans, a homeless man called out "Hey Walkin' Cane, got some spare change for a brother?!" Austin took the jibe as his nickname. In 1996, after years of battling the inevitable, his left leg was amputated below the knee. A year after the surgery, he returned to the music scene stronger and without need of a cane. In 2002, Austin and Karen Starks were married at Sun Studios in Memphis, Tennessee, and began recording his 706 Union Ave. CD at the legendary studio immediately after the ceremony. "The thought of recording and getting married in the same room where many of my heroes took their first steps was incredible." Africa's Daughters: A Documentary

For girls like Hoctavia Sabiti and Ruth Aringo, both from Uganda, graduating from high school is something almost beyond reach, nearly unimaginable. And yet, as 17-year old Hoctavia expresses in the film, "When you educate a girl, you educate a whole nation." The meaning behind these words was the motivation for "Africa's Daughters", by Natalie Halpern. Says Halpern, "It's widely accepted that education is the cornerstone of progress for individuals and countries alike. But when girls in developing countries are educated, especially at the high school level, the benefits to society - social, economic, and political - are multiplied many times over. Hoctavia and Ruth, two remarkable young women, represent the dreams of millions of girls in Uganda and across Africa who understand that the only way to break the cycle of poverty in which they've grown up is to complete high school and, hopefully, go on to college. Capturing their stories of hope and determination, and seeing how they're rising above cultural beliefs and traditions to realize their full potential has been an amazing experience. Their courage and their spirit have moved me. I hope that their stories reach across borders and move others to learn more about the impact of girls' education, while inspiring young people to stay in school and pursue even the most impossible dream."



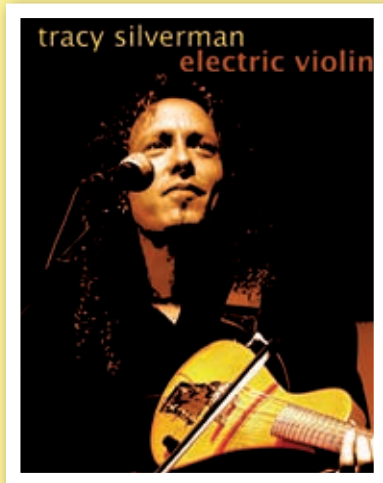

Christy Whitman: Suicidology 101



Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among college students. Most suicides are preventable. Do you know how to tell if your friend is suicidal? High Honors: Graduating with an all-college cumulative GPA of 3.75 or higher. Since the commencement program

is printed before spring term grades are recorded, honor graduates are identified based on their GPA at the beginning of spring term.

Rehearsal: Forget it; we don't have one!

Now the basic facts:

When: College Credit Commencement and Adult High School/GED Graduation are May 2. Information about when to report for the ceremonies and how to confirm your attendance will be mailed to graduates' homes in early April.

Where: Jacksonville Veterans Memorial Arena

Who: Anyone may participate who has graduated at the end of Summer Term '08, Fall Term '08 or Spring Term '09.

Caps and Gowns: Available for purchase in your campus bookstore in April.

Graduation Announcements: Available from the campus bookstore in March. Neither announcements nor tickets are required for admission to the arena. Your family and friends are welcome to attend the ceremony.

Graduation Photos: Official photographers will take your picture as you cross the stage and a proof will be mailed to you. Photo purchase information will be included with the proof if you wish to buy copies.
