Effective March 1, 2013, Florida State College at Jacksonville will be a tobacco and smoke free organization. Accordingly, Florida State College at Jacksonville will prohibit the use, distribution or sale of all tobacco products in all indoor and exterior college-owned property, all institution-sponsored off-campus events, and in all campus-owned vehicles. 

American History Through Song and Story

Sparky and Rhonda Rucker's program, Heroes and Hard Times: American History Through Song and Story, takes audiences on a journey that spans over three centuries of African American history, including slavery, the Underground Railroad, the Civil War, the birth of blues music, and the Civil Rights Movement. Each era is interspersed with stories and popular songs from the time period. They accompany themselves with finger picking and bottleneck blues guitar, blues harmonica, old-time banjo, piano, spoons, and bones. With more than forty years of performing, Sparky and Rhonda have performed at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. and the Smithsonian Folklife Festival as well as NPR's On Point, Prairie Home Companion, Mountain Stage, and Morning Edition. Their recording Treasures & Tears was nominated for a W.C. Handy Award, and their music is also included on the Grammy-nominated anthology Singing Through the Hard Times. The Ruckers were recently awarded the Howard "Louie Bluie" Armstrong Legacy Award. Their latest CD, Let Freedom Ring, includes several songs highlighting the struggle for freedom throughout America's past.

Let's start with a few definitions:

Graduation: The completion of all requirements necessary for your academic program.

Commencement: The formal ceremony at which degrees or certificates are conferred, held at the end of spring term.

Cum Laude: Graduating with an all-college cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.5-3.64. **Magna Cum Laude:** Graduating with an all-college cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.65-3.79.

Summa Cum Laude: Graduating with an all-college cumulative GPA of 3.80 or higher. Since the commencement program is printed before spring term grades are recorded, honor graduates are identified based on their GPA at the beginning of spring term.

Rehearsal: Forget it; we don't have one!

Now the basic facts:

When: College Credit Commencement will be in early May. We'll have an exact date posted for you soon! Information about when to report for your ceremony and how to confirm your attendance will be mailed to graduates' homes in early April.

Where: Jacksonville Veterans' Memorial Arena

Who: Anyone who has graduated at the end of Summer Term '12, Fall Term '12 or Spring Term '13 may participate.

Caps and Gowns: Available for purchase in your campus bookstore in April.

Graduation Announcements: Available from the campus bookstore in March. Neither announcements nor tickets are required for admission to the arena. Your family and friends are welcome to attend the ceremony.

Graduation Photos: Official photographers will take your picture as you cross the stage, and a proof will be mailed to you. Photo purchase information will be included with the proof if you wish to buy copies.
