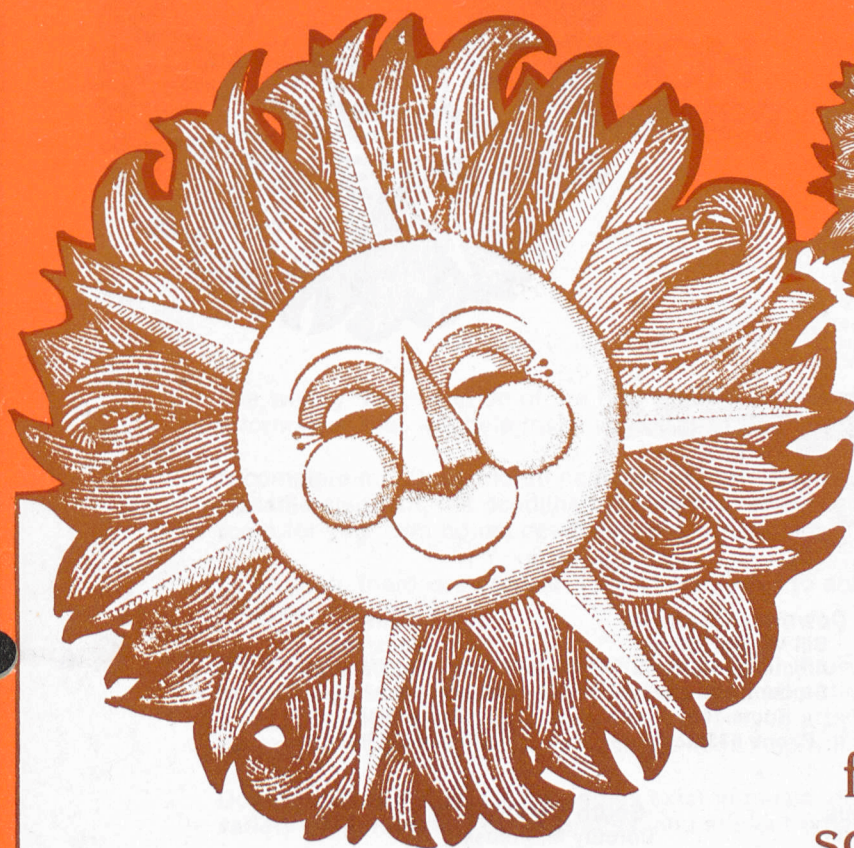
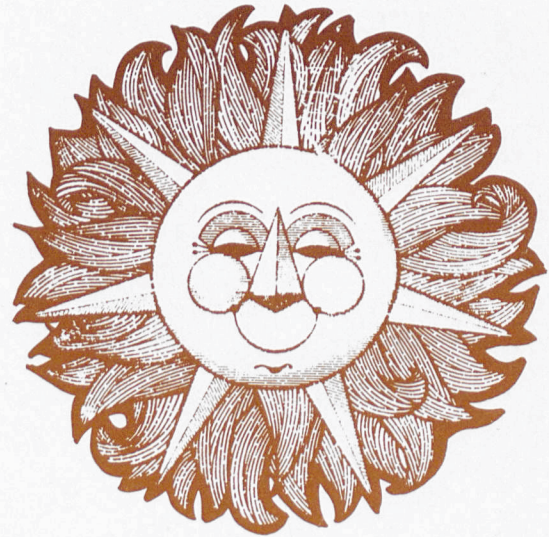

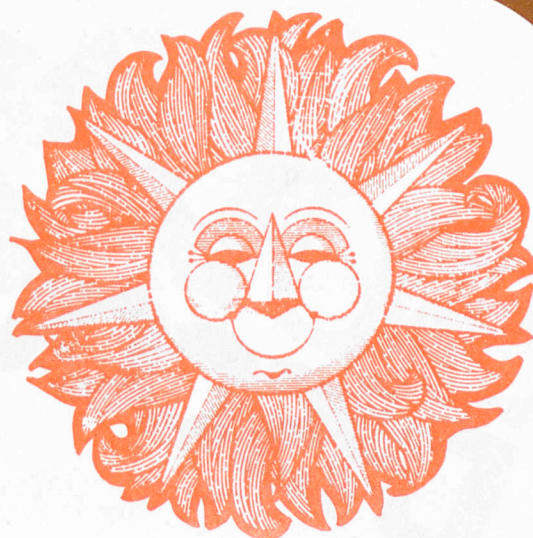

Films

ALIEN - 1979, 124 mins. - Ridley Scott. A stunning visual nightmare where terror lurks in every corner. An outstanding cast brings the crew to life, making the film even more frightening because the characters and their reactions seem so real. Brilliant set designs, shocking special effects and a breathtaking alien design add to the film's impact.

APOCALYPSE NOW - 1979, 146 mins. - Francis Coppola. The film is the consummate statement about the horror, the madness, the sensuousness and the moral dilemma that was Vietnam. Coppola assaults our senses making us truly understand the beauty and attraction of war, and at the same time we are revolted by its horrors.

ARTHUR - 1981, 100 mins. - Steve Gordon. Millionaire playboy Arthur (Dudley Moore), out on a spree every night in Manhattan, dances to the tune of his grandmother's purse strings. To be sure of his inheritance, he is resigned to marrying the dreary debutante his parents have chosen, until a lovable shoplifter (Liza Minnelli) steals his heart. Arthur's upper crust servant (John Gielgud) who almost steals the show, is disdainful of Liza until the couple's true love wins him over.

CADDYSHACK - 1980, 107 mins. - Harold Ramis. A wild and irreverent swing at country club life featuring Chevy Chase, Bill Murray, Ted Knight and Rodney Dangerfield and gophers. Murray, as a deranged groundskeeper, plots to blow the gophers and the others to Kingdom Come!

CLASH OF THE TITANS - 1981, 118 mins. - Desmond Davis. A uniquely ambitious journey into a world of pure magic. Harry Hamlin is Perseus, son of Zeus (the incomparable Laurence Olivier), who battles this monstrous menagerie for the love of beautiful Andromeda.

EXCALIBUR - 1981, 140 mins. - John Boorman. Brilliantly recreates the timeless myth of the boy Arthur, who rises to rule Camelot after extracting the sword Excalibur from its stone, then falls with the kingdom's decay. From the whimsical yet worldly Merlin (Nicol Williamson) and the sinister Morgana (Helen Mirren) to Arthur (Nigel Terry) and Guenevere (Cherie Lunghi), the players are uniformly excellent.

FAME - 1981, 127 mins. - Alan Parker. An electrifying musical drama set in Manhattan's celebrated High School of the Performing Arts. It is an incisive look at the hopes and dreams of eight young people vying for a foothold in the world of show business.

THE FRENCH LIEUTENANT'S WOMAN - 1981, 124 mins. - Kael Reisz. Academy Award winner Meryl Streep stars as Anna, a twentieth-century actress portraying Sara Woodruff, a mysterious nineteenth-century woman. Constructed as a film within a film, we watch as Sara's moral torment curiously parallels that of her modern-day counterpart.

KRAMER VS. KRAMER - 1980, 105 mins. - Robert Benton. Dustin Hoffman shines in this film about parents entangled in a legal and emotional tug-of-war for their child. Ted is a red-hot Madison Avenue account executive who lacks sensitivity to his wife's needs for self-fulfillment. Joanna (Meryl Streep) abandons her role as wife-mother leaving husband and son to their own charming devices. Eventually she returns to lay claim to her adorable seven-year-old son (Justin Henry) in a disturbingly realistic portrayal.

RAGTIME - 1981, 155 mins. - Milos Forman. Based upon the novel, "Ragtime" by E. L. Doctorow. America, 1906. The world is in transition. The film tells of the murder, scandal, and love affair of the century—and the century was just beginning.

RICHARD PRYOR LIVE IN CONCERT - 1980, 78 mins. - Jeff Margolis. The film recounts the 1978 concert tour of comedian Richard Pryor, one of Hollywood's most volatile, unpredictable and gifted performers. Cry, laugh and sit in awe at Pryor's outrageous brand of comedy. Filmed live... unedited... and uncensored. He's at his funniest, raunchiest and most sensitive.

STRIPES - 1981, 105 mins. - Ivan Reitman. You lose your job, your car, your apartment, and your girlfriend all in the course of one bad day. John Winger (Bill Murray), and Russell Ziskey (Harold Ramis) did and they found themselves joining the "New" U. S. Army to help make the world safe for democracy... and meet girls, while nearly setting off World War III by invading Czechoslovakia.

WHOSE LIFE IS IT ANYWAY? - 1981, 118 mins. - John Badham. A heart-wrenching story of a vibrant sculptor (Richard Dreyfuss) paralyzed in an auto accident. Committed to a hospital bed, intellect intact, and unable to continue his work, he makes the decision to be taken off all life-supporting systems which conflict with his doctor's (John Cassavetes) idea of professional duty.

September 7—THE OBSCURE OBJECT OF DESIRE—1977, 100 mins. - Louis Bunuel (French/Spanish). Fernando Rey is a fiftyish gentleman in love with a woman half his age, played by two different actresses who alternatively embody his desires: the one, a dainty virgin; the other, a blowsy whore.

September 14—A BOY AND HIS DOG—1975, 91 mins. - L. Q. Jones. An offbeat vision of a future earth, this first-rate imaginative adventure is based on the award-winning novella by Harlan Ellison. In the year 2024, Vic and his dog Blood survive against all odds in a post-atomic wilderness.

September 21—FROM THE LIFE OF THE MARIONETTES—1981, 104 mins. Ingmar Bergman (German). Acclaimed as Bergman's most vital and original work, the film is a daring, articulate, and analytical exploration into the psychology of murder. A quite different type of detective drama.

September 28—LA CAGE AUX FOLLIES—1979, 91 mins. - Edouard Molinaro (French). The largest grossing foreign film ever to play in the United States, it details the hilarious efforts of a pair of aging homosexuals to pave the way for true love between a young heterosexual couple.

October 5—BREAKER MORANT—1979, 107 mins. - Bruce Beresford. Winner of the Cannes Film Festival Award as Best Supporting Actor, Jack Thompson gives a brilliant, moving performance as the lawyer who defends three falsely accused Australian soldiers against charges of murder during the Boer War.

October 12—KAMOURASKA—1975, 119 mins. - Claude Jutra (French). Genvieve Bujold is marvelous as a liberated woman in 19th century Quebec who refuses to yield to the oppressive demands of her husband, her lover, and her society.

October 19—GRAND HOTEL—1932, 113 mins. - Edmund Goulding. Greta Garbo is the Russian ballerina who falls in love with John Barrymore, a debonair jewel thief. Other guests include a sexy, young John Crawford and an irasci-

ble Wallace Beery. One of the great ones and one of the first Academy Award winners.

October 26—MELVIN AND HOWARD—1981, 95 mins. - Jonathan Demme. The warm, comic story of Melvin Dummar (Paul LeMat), his rescue of the half-dead billionaire Howard Hughes (Jason Robards), and the controversial "Mormon Will." Mary Steenburgen won an Oscar as Best Supporting Actress, and the film was named one of the year's ten best by the National Board of Review.

November 2—MANHATTAN—1979, 96 mins. - Woody Allen. The director's portrait of the modern relationships and lifestyles of New Yorkers combines the humor of "Annie Hall" and the drama of "Interiors." Co-stars include Meryl Streep, Diane Keaton, and Mariel Hemingway.

November 9—NOSFERATU—1979, 107 mins. - Werner Herzog (German). Klaus Kinski renders a sympathetic and flesh-chilling portrayal of Bram Stoker's tormented Transylvanian night stalker, Count Dracula. The object of his attentions is the beautiful Isabelle Adjani.

November 16—MEAN STREETS—1973, 112 mins. - Martin Scorsese. Harvey Keitel is an ambitious young man struggling to climb up the Mafia's ladder of success, but a strong Catholic upbringing, a devoted young friend (Robert DeNiro), and a girl friend get in the way.

November 23—THE BRIDE WORE BLACK—1968, 107 mins. - Francois Truffaut (French). Ostensibly a loving tribute to Alfred Hitchcock, Truffaut works again with Jeanne Moreau ("Jules and Jim") as a bereaved bride who steadily wreaks her vengeance on the men who did her wrong.

November 30—WALKABOUT—1971, 95 mins. - Nicholas Roeg. Two children, stranded by their suicidal father in the Australian outback, must rely on a young Aboriginal boy to survive. Their odyssey, magnificently photographed, carries them back to the innocence of nature and forward to their own inescapable present.
