(Carlos Saura-1986-Spanish) Saura combines breathtaking visuals & sensuous choreography to tell the story of gypsy lovers who use sorcery to banish the haunting presence of the woman's dead husband

(Louis Malle-1985-American)

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Qualifications

a. Participation in the 23rd Annual FCCJ Talent-Variety Show is limited to FCCJ students, instructors, administrators, or career employees. Where there is more than one participant in an act, at least one of the performers in the group must be a student, an instructor, an administrator or career employee at FCCJ.

b. Bands requiring set-ups of electronic equipment may not participate in the Talent Show as contestants or accompaniment.

c. Singers may not sing over a recorded voice. Lip-sync is allowed.

d. If you are currently performing for pay, you may not participate as a contestant. 2. Auditions:

a. All prospective contestants are required to attend one of four audition sessions which are scheduled as follows:

Mon., October 10, 3-6 PM/Kent Campus Aud. F128 Tues., October 11, 3-6 PM/Kent Campus Aud. F128 Wed., October 12, 6-10 PM/Kent Campus Aud. F128 Thurs., October 13, 6-10 PM/Kent Campus Aud. F128

b. Auditions will be conducted by a panel composed of the FCCJ Student Activities Directors and students. Their decisions as to who will participate in the Talent Show production will be final.

c. Everyone who wishes to participate in the show must audition. If it is impossible for you to attend any of the scheduled auditions, you may make special arrangements by contacting Mrs. B.J. Hausman at 387-8374. No auditions will be scheduled after October 19, 1988.

d. Those contestants selected to participate will be notified on or before October 24, 1988.

e. Application forms must be completed and returned to your campus Student Activities Office no later than 5:00 PM on Friday, October 7, 1988.
