



September 12 – BABETTE'S FEAST (Gabriel Axel-1987-Denmark/France-102 min.)

The acclaimed adaptation of Isak Dinesen's story about a French cook, hired by two spinsters, who serves a magnificent meal which the diners cannot acknowledge for fear of God's wrath. Winner of the 1987 Academy Award for Best Foreign Film.

### September 26 – THE HIT

(Stephen Frears-1984-Great Britain-100 min.)
Stephen Frears' ("Dangerous Liaisons") first feature film is a dark comedy, in the John Huston style, about a hood who sells out to the mob and flees the country. Two hit men, who attempt to take him back for "sentencing," kill all the wrong people and leave a trail a mile wide for the police to follow.

### October 3 – VIRGIN MACHINE

(Monika Treut-1988-Germany-85 min.)

A story of a young woman who sets out to find happiness by following her mother to America. In the dreamland of California, she meets several remarkable women, including a female sex therapist with whom she falls in love. Unusual camera work allows the viewer to see the world through the eyes and ears of the actresses.

### October 10 - ANIMATION CELEBRATION

(Various directors-1986-International-90 min.)

An entertaining collection of over twenty exciting, innovative, surprising and funny cartoons selected from the best segments shown at recent animation festivals. The collection is from the same people who gave us the "International Tournee of Animation."

### October 17 - THE MIGHTY QUINN

(Carl Schenkel-1989-United States-98 min.)

Denzel Washington's portrayal of the proud and fearless police chief of a small Caribbean island established him as a major Hollywood talent in this lighthearted crime caper. Robert Townsend ("Hollywood Shuffle") also stars. An outstanding reggae music score helps create a hypnotic effect.

### October 24 - HOUSEKEEPING

(Bill Forsyth-1987-Great Britain-116 min.)

Bill Forsyth's ("Local Hero," "Comfort & Joy," etc.) unique style of combining offbeat humor with touching insight is clearly evident is this story about an eccentric free spirit who returns to her childhood home to care for her two orphaned nieces.

### October 31 – ELEVATOR TO THE GALLOWS

(Louis Malle-1958-France-90 min.)

A special "treat" for Halloween is Louis Malle's ("Atlantic City," "My Dinner with Andre," "Au Revoir Les Enfants," etc.) very first feature film. Jeanne Moreau stars as a bored housewife who connives with an aging war hero to murder her inconvenient husband. A rarely screened classic that is a "must-see" film for all true

November 7 – A WORLD APART (Chris Menges-1988-Great Britain-112 min.)

Barbara Hershey ("Hanna and Her Sisters" and "Shy People") stars in Chris Menges's ("The Killing Fields" and "The Missions") bases on-fact drama about a South African family caught up in the early struggle against apartheid.

### November 14 – MEN

(Doris Dorrie-1986-Germany-99 min.)

One of the most popular recent films in Germany, MEN . . . is a wacky comedy of modern sexual manners. When a self-satisfied, philandering executive finds out that his wife is having an affair, he moves in with her lover, a boher tist, and turns him into a materialistic clone of himself in order to win back his wife.






### PHI THETA KAPPA (PTK)










### **HEALTH EXPO**


