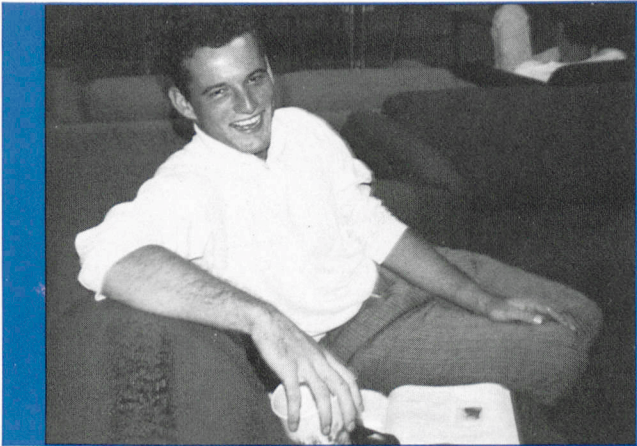
STUDENT ACTIVITIES CENTERS

PHI THETA KAPPA

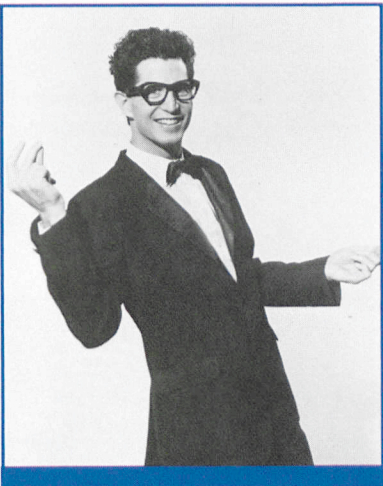
