Merriweather performs music based in Celtic and American traditions blending old and new acoustic sounds. The unusual timbres of the hammered dulcimer and wooden flute, combined with the more familiar sounds of mandolin and guitar, create a distinctive sound with additional spice provided by octave mandolin, penny whistle, wooden piccolo and stoodi box.

The notes Chris Smither coaxes from his blue acoustic electric guitar are at once ancient and utterly contemporary. His vocals encompass an emotional breadth impossible for most performers. It's a rough voice, a gritty voice, a voice that can howl and shout one moment, coax and soothe and reach deep inside the listener the next. On last year's Bonnie Raitt "Collection," only one writer (aside from Raitt herself ) had more than one song included-Chris Smither. Her signature tunes, "Love Me Like a Man" and "IFeel The Same" are Smither compositions.
