




# Wellness

### Community Service/Volunteerism

For their first year, the student volunteer centers registered more than 1,000 students and more than 14,000 hours of volunteer service. The hours donated represented a wide range of activities including planting trees, giving blood and donating time at churches, schools and hospitals, among others. The activities were as varied as the many students who benefited from giving something back to their community.

Many FCCJ faculty actively encourage students to perform community service, often rewarding extra credit for the extra effort. In today's extremely competitive job market, community service activities on a résumé can make the difference in a job search. Volunteering is an investment in your future and in the future well-being of your community.

### Phi Theta Kappa (PTK)

Phi Theta Kappa is a national honor society for community and junior colleges. To join PTK you must have completed 12 credit hours of study, maintained an overall GPA average of 3.0 and have made a 3.5 GPA or higher during at least one term. Eligible candidates will receive a letter of invitation. Monthly meetings are held on each campus. For more information, call 381-3674 or 381-3440.

### **Student Government Association**

The Student Government Association (SGA) serves as the official voice of the student body and as the connection between the student body, the faculty and the administration of the College. Each campus is represented by SGA, who addresses collegewide issues. Accomplishments of the SGA during 1992-93 include influencing the add/drop deadline, offering JTA bus tickets on campus, organizing blood drives, providing United Way support and numerous other services and social activities. The Board of Governors of the FCCJ Foundation added an SGA representative — for the first time — during 1992-93.

Elections for vice president, senators and representatives are held during the fall term. The president and a senator are elected during the winter term. 





The newspaper is published during the fall, winter and spring terms. The main office is located at the Downtown Campus with bureaus at other campuses coming in the near future.


#### So you want to be a decision maker (editor)?
