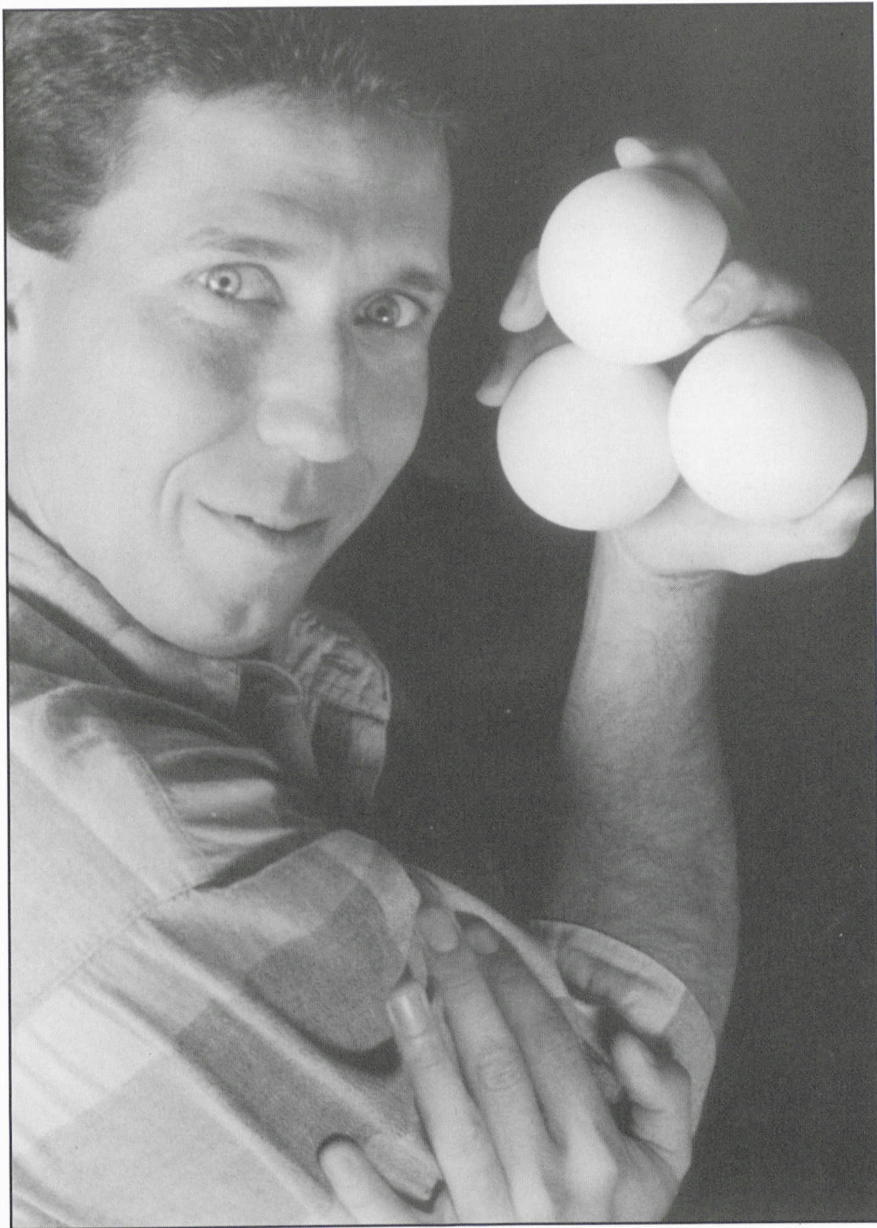
13TH ANNUAL COLLEGEWIDE PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION
