The StarCard has a one-time, non-refundable fee of $\$ 5$. The cost of the StarCard will be added to tuition or included in the application fee. The features of the StarCard are campus security, library material
checkout, discount ticket purchases, ATM access (optional) and Sprint long distance access (optional).
