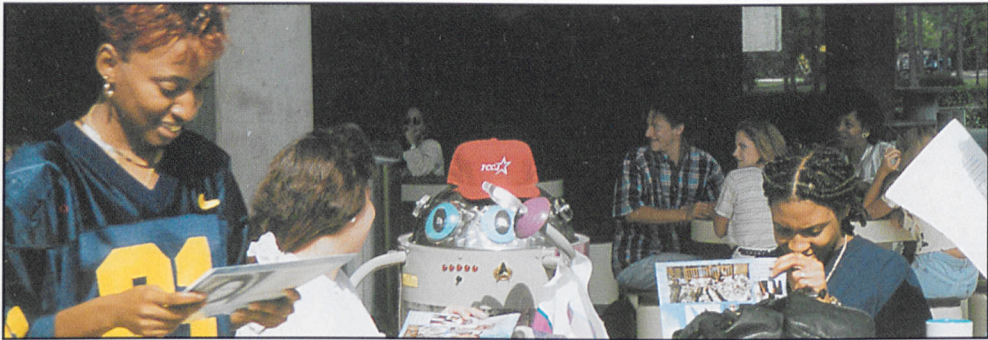
# INTRODUCTION

# STARCARD

All students attending classes on any FCCJ campus, Open Campus Deerwood Center, Donald D. Zell Urban Resource Center, Geis Marine and Industrial Technology Center, Betty P. Cook Nassau County Center or area military bases are required to have and carry the College's official identification card, the StarCard, while on College property.

The StarCard has a one-time, non-refundable fee of \$5. The cost of the StarCard will be added to tuition or included in the application fee. The features of the StarCard are campus security, library material checkout, discount ticket purchases, ATM access (optional) and Sprint long distance access (optional).

To obtain the StarCard, take a current registration or application receipt and a picture ID (drivers license, military ID, etc.) to any StarCard center location listed below. Hours of operation will be posted at the center.

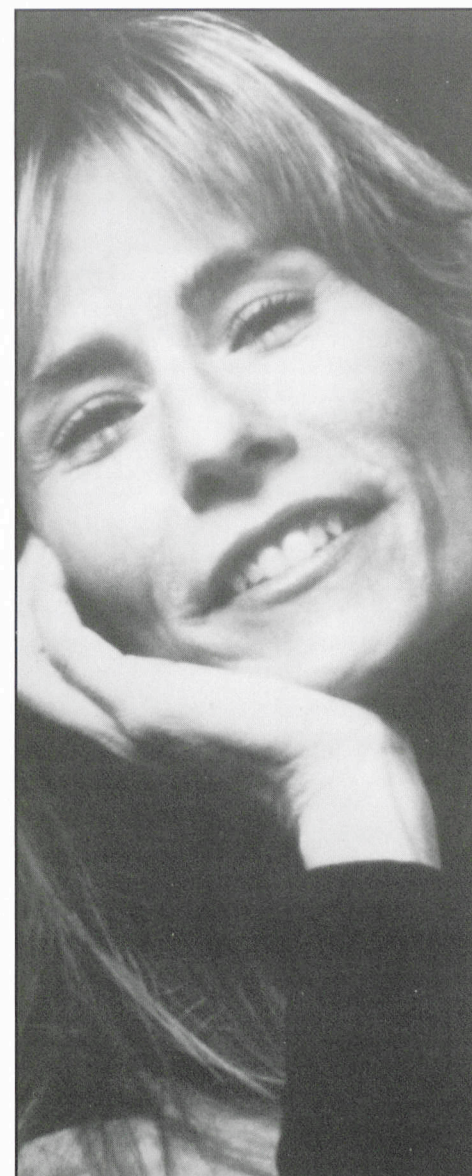

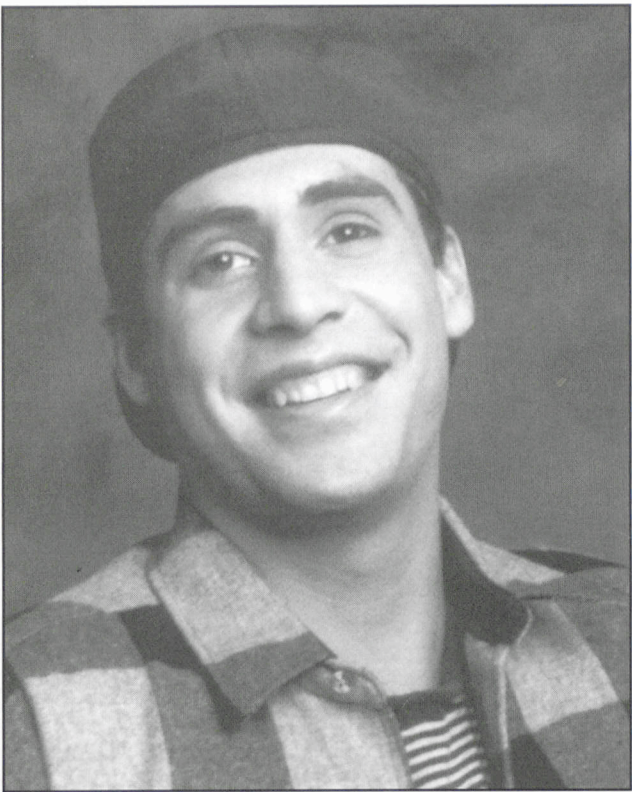

Laura Haywood, publicist, science-fiction writer, reviewer, and now a playwright

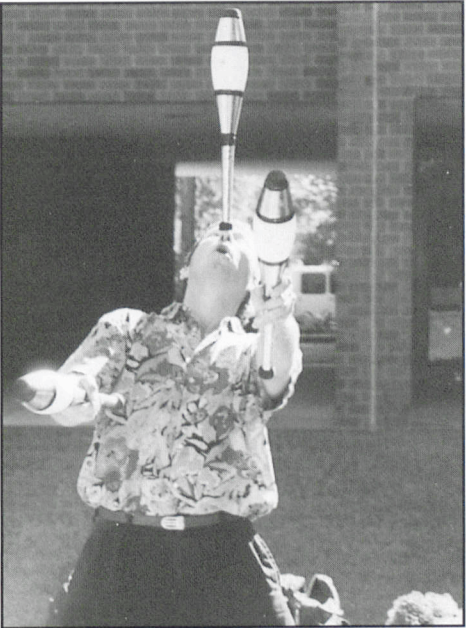

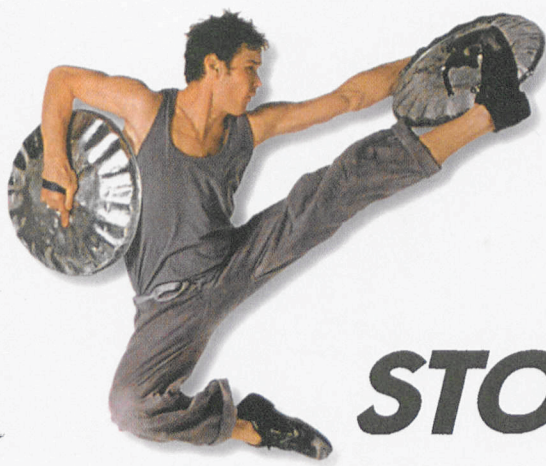

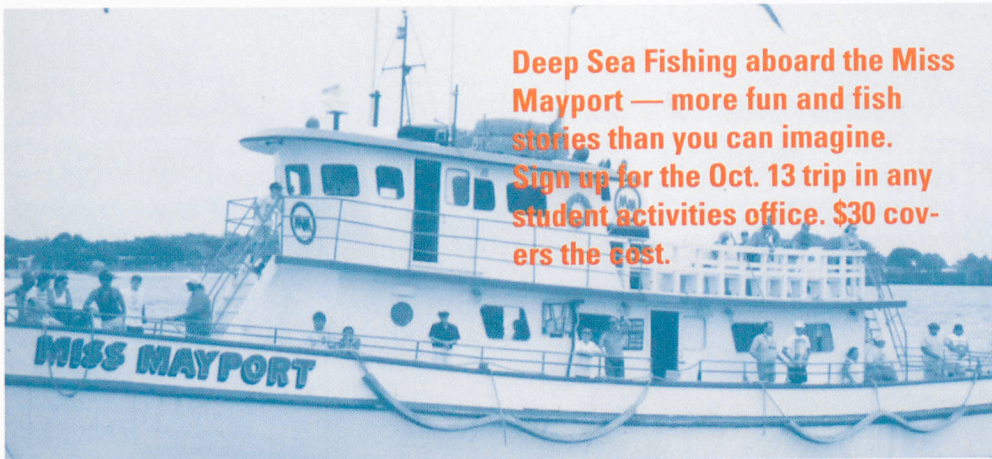
Student Leadership Development Program

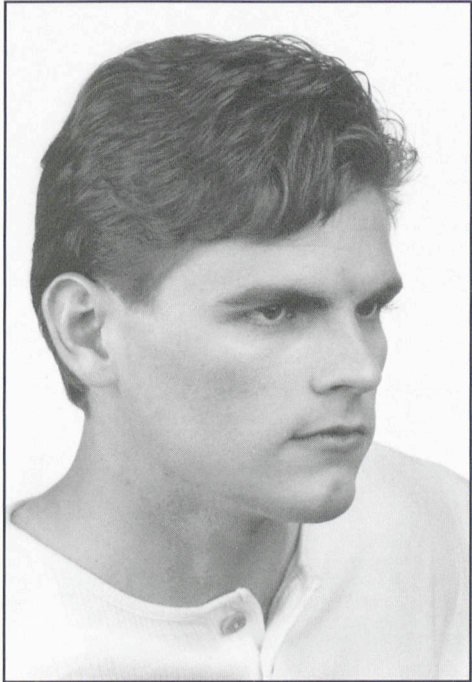




FCCJ's Athletics
