



SEPTEMBER FEST III

PROSE AND POETRY EXPERTS TO SPEAK AT THE 3RD ANNUAL SEPTEMBER FEST FOR WRITERS.

The third annual September Fest for Writers will feature five sessions of expert advice from prose writers, poets, and editors. The event is scheduled for Friday, Sept. 18, at FCCJ's North Campus.

Speakers will include the following:

GEORGE GILPATRICK— This Orange Park poet focuses on his own writing, but also takes time to promote poetry readings and assist other First Coast aspiring poets. He has won prizes in contests sponsored by the Florida First Coast Writers' Festival and the International Institution of Elvisology and the Elvisian Era. He also edits and publishes scrapbooks of others' poetry.

FRANK GREEN— This Jacksonville resident conducts writing workshops for the group he founded, the Bard Society. He runs the oldest continuously-offered workshop in northeast Florida. Besides speaking at the Cape May Writers' Conference and the Florida First Coast Writers' Festival, he has also edited many published manuscripts, acted as a ghost writer, and assisted businesses with their writing needs.

WANDA KACHER— This registered nurse has written two books, *My Friend Ben* and *Nautilus*. She earned her nurse degree from FCCJ and is employed by Genesis Rehabilitation Hospitals in pediatrics and rehab. Her medical background provides material for her writing and she will often base a story around a character with a disability or a serious disease.

TOM LASHLEY— Lashley, a native of Valdosta, Ga., lives in Mayo where he is the assistant principal for curriculum at Suwannee High School. He is the author of *Malevolence* (Sterling House), which is set in the forbidding peaks and valleys of the Appalachians. The book's protagonist, Dermont McCraney, is forced to confront a hideous secret from his past. The keeper of the secret is Boonie, a psychopathic killer who likes to conduct secret Druidical rituals.

YVONNE WEST—This Jacksonville resident is the author of two novels, *The Dolphin Pool* and *Rosemary for Remembrance*. She uses European settings frequently in her writings drawing upon her birth and childhood in Corsica when she and her American parents lived in the city.

Registration begins at 8 a.m. in the atrium of the Zeke Bryant Building. September Fest's five sessions will be free to FCCJ students and staff and to active members of the North Florida Writers Association. Others will pay only \$10 for the day (make checks payable to "NFW"). For more information contact Howard Denson at 766–6559.

STUDENT VOLUNTEER CENTERS
