Trinidad Tripoli Steel Band

Warm up the new millennium with a little steel and reggae! From Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, to a world tour, this amazing group of performers plays a repertoire of music that ranges from classical to rock and roll...on oil drums. This feat has astounded audiences not only because of its oil drums, but also because of the unbelievable fidelity and artistic accomplishments with which they render each concert or dance, whether it be modern, classical or their native reggae Calypso. The Calypso numbers are in a class by

themselves, combined with exciting dancing and chanting as only the natives of Trinidad are capable of doing.

Born from the desperate days following World War II when it was not possible to get their instruments or money to play their Calypso music, the natives of Trinidad discovered that abandoned oil drums could be used for musical tunes. Thus began the original steel drum band, and now Trinidad Tripoli has played such pockets of sophistication as the Rockefeller Plaza, Central Park and Lincoln Center in New York City. Now's your chance to see them at FCCJ on January 18th and 19th.

Barbara Bailey Hutchison

Grammy award winning singer/songwriter Barbara Bailey Hutchison brings her finely crafted songs and clever wit back to FCCJ in March. Her voice is familiar to millions of television and radio listeners across the country. The hundreds of commercials she has sung for Mc Donald's, Hallmark Cards, and other national advertisers attest to her vocal prowess.

Believing "pigeon holes are for birds", she defies categorization. Some draw comparisons to Shown Colvin or Jewel, while others hear a likeness to Joni Mitchell or Mary Chapin Carpenter. Her show is fresh and energetic, offering music and stories that serve to inspire and amuse. Her music speaks to issues of tolerance and human rights, as well as personal relationships. Hutchison started Dakota Records, the independent record label responsible for eight of her 13 albums, because she "...just didn't fit the major label mold", and she wanted to maintain more control over the content and production of her music.

In addition to receiving the music industry's highest recognition, a Grammy award, Hutchison has been voted "Best Solo Performer" and "Best Acoustic Performer" by a national magazine poll of colleges and universities throughout the United States and Canada. She says she's comfortable with her career, happy to be writing meaningful songs, and to be able to present them to intelligent and attentive listeners. She loves nothing better than sharing her songs telling their stories, and joking with her audience. Should her music receive the radio exposure it deserves, the rest of the world will learn what her fans already know: Barbara and her music are full of grace, humor, hopefulness, and most of all, deep humanity. Karen Goldberg

Now with six records, five tours of Europe and one of Australia, singer/songwriter Karen Goldberg has appeared with 10,000 Maniacs, The B52's, Grace Slick, Randy Newman, Carrot Top, Leo Kottke, Ritchie Havens and more, and her smooth singing, innovative guitar work, and tongue-in-cheek humor is bound to be one of the highlights of Women's History Month. Both funny and poignant, Karen's Lilith Music show tackles issues of concern to most women (and the men in their lives) like "PMS", "Biological Clock", and "House of Marriage". In addition, her show explores the treatment of topics like independence, career, relationships, family, sex and love, with songs by favorite contemporary female songwriters.

Karen also presents "No Strings Attached", a talk about self management and independence in the music business and beyond. More and more women in the music business are choosing to run their own record labels and manage their own careers. In this candid, open talk, Karen takes you down the often twisted path of alternative approaches to success in the music business. See how these alternatives can be applied to many other independent business endeavors. Topics include goal setting, time management, organization, prioritizing, delegating, building a resume and promotional materials, and using available resources (library, bookstores, internet), followed by some simple, thought-provoking exercises to help target individual career goals.
