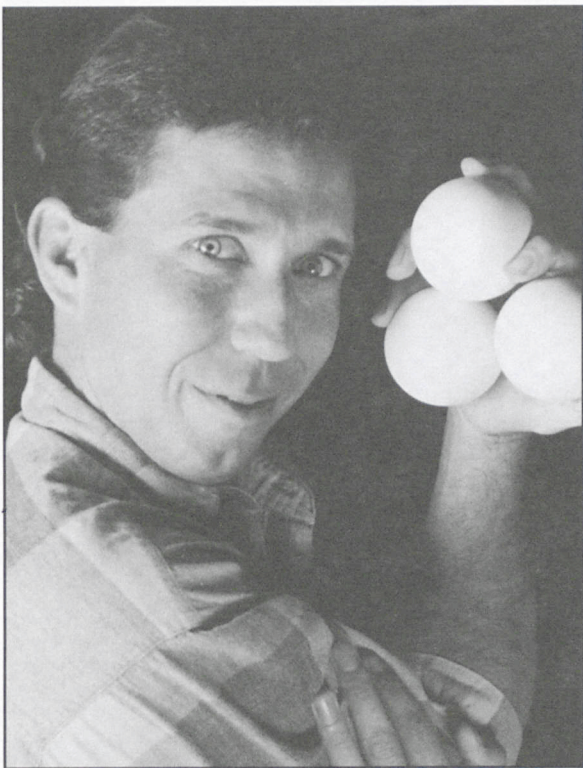

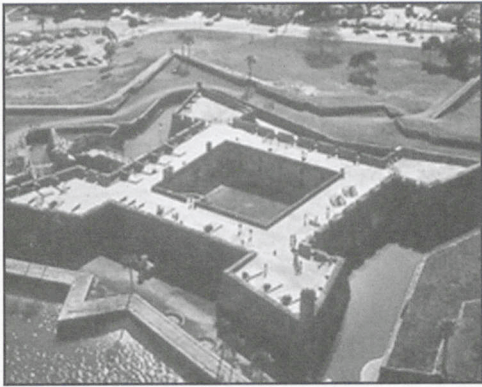

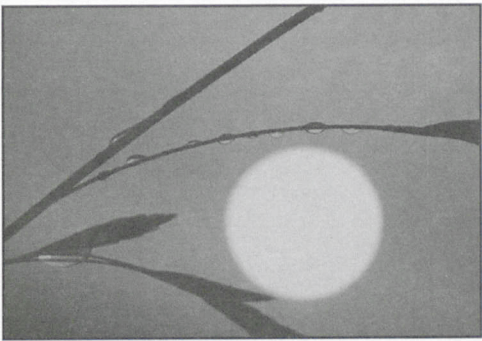
St. Augustine, October 27

Jekyll Island, November 17

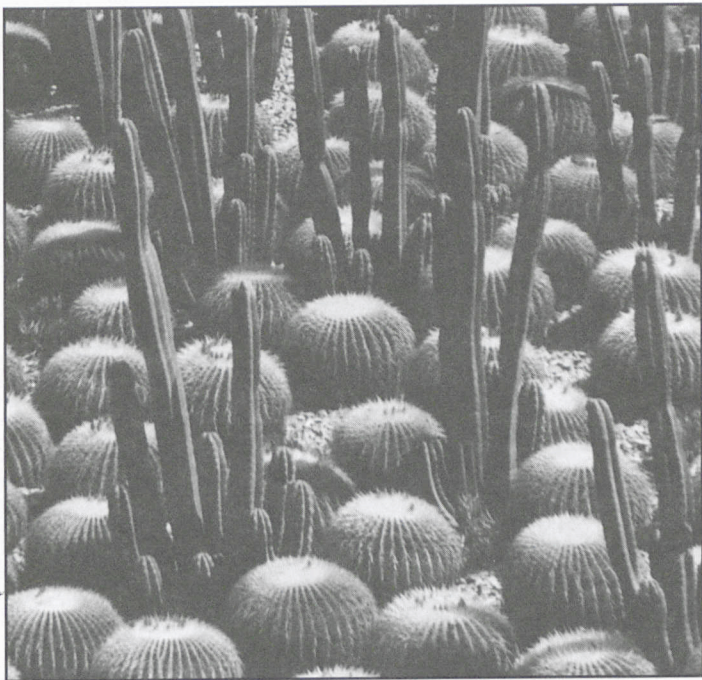

December 7, 2001, is the 60th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, marking the United States' entry into World War II. This program will present the historical facts of the battle of Pearl Harbor, including a timeline of the events leading up to and following December 7, a description of the planning of the attack from the Japanese perspective, and historical video clips.
