December 2002 marks the 100th anniversary of flight. In honor of this milestone, Thomas Reilly and Lynn Homan present "Wings Over Florida". Florida has been the site of more aviation "firsts" than any other state. The first night flight in an airplane was made by Lincoln Beachey in Tampa in 1911; Tony Jannus and crew inaugurated the St. Petersburg-Tampa Airboat Line, the world's first airline, in 1914 guided missiles were tested at Arcadia in 1919; Bessie Coleman, the first African American licensed pilot, died tragically at Jacksonville in 1926. Florida-founded Pan Am, Eastern, Air Florida and National Airlines all played a role in the state's development as a tourist destination. Come along with Lynn and Thomas on this journey into Florida's rich aviation history: Dec. 3 at 9:30am in NC C-136 and Dec. 4 at 9am in DC A-1068 and at 12:30pm in KC F-128.
