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Olympian Kicks Off Leadership Series

Ruben Gonzalez knows about achievement and living one's life as an adventure, and as a three-time Olympian and a national luge champion, he kicks off this semester's Leadership Series. A master storyteller, Ruben inspires audiences to think differently, to live life with passion and to have the courage to take the necessary steps toward their goals — to push beyond their self-imposed limitations. To live life on their own terms in pursuit of their dreams.

The challenges Ruben had to overcome make his story powerful. Ruben, who has been called "the Rudy of the Olympics", didn't take up the sport of luge until he was 21 years old. Making it to the Olympics with such a late start demanded unwavering faith,



unrelenting persistence, and the courage to act no matter what obstacles lay ahead. In 2002, Ruben beat the odds again by qualifying to compete in his third Olympics at the age of 39! Ruben shares with his audiences the lessons he discovered by rising to the daily challenges of organizing and executing a plan to qualify for the Olympics. Ruben relates how those lessons can be applied to every challenge we face in our personal, family and professional lives. Ruben's story gives people hope, and his mission is to equip and influence others to achieve greatness.

Trinidad Tripoli Steel Band

Warm up with a little steel and reggae! From Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, to a world tour, this amazing group of performers plays a repertoire of music that ranges from classical to rock and roll...on oil drums. This feat has astounded audiences not only because of its oil drums, but also because of the unbelievable fidelity and artistic accomplishments with which they render each concert or dance, whether it be modern, classical or their native reggae Calypso.

Born from the desperate days following World War II when it was not possible to get their instruments or money to play their Calypso music, the natives of Trinidad discovered that abandoned oil drums could be used for musical tones. Thus began the original steel drum band, and now Trinidad Tripoli has taken the stage in Rockfeller Plaza, Central Park and the Lincoln Center in New York City, as well as stages around the world. Sparky Rucker Headlines African American History Month



Kicking off African American History Month is internationally acclaimed James "Sparky" Rucker, recognized as a leading folklorist, historian, musician, storyteller, and author who has been singing songs and telling stories from the American tradition for over 35 years. Accompanying Sparky is his wife Rhonda, who practiced medicine for five years before becoming a full-time folk musician. She is a versatile performer, playing blues harmonica, piano, banjo, and creating wonderful vocal harmonies.

Whether Rucker is garbed in the uniform of a Union soldier or in his more familiar black boots, vest, neckerchief, and cowboy hat, he takes an audience on an educational and emotional journey that ranges from poignant stories of slavery and war to an amusing rendition of a Brer Rabbit tale to his witty commentaries on current events. Sparky has appeared on numerous radio programs, including National Public Radio's *Morning Edition, Prairie Home*

Companion, and Mountain Stage. He also performed in Carry it On and Amazing Grace: Music in America, two videos produced by the Public Broadcasting System. The Ruckers' 1991 audio release, Treasures & Tears, was nominated for the W.C. Handy Award for Best Traditional Recording; they contributed music to the television miniseries The Wild West; and their unique renditions of John Henry and Jesse James were used in National Geographic's 1994 media project entitled Storytelling in North America.

The Ruckers' concert performance is a humor-filled journey through 400 years of African-American cultural and folk history. It includes railroad songs, Appalachian music, old-time blues, slave songs, Civil War music, gospel, work songs, cowboy music, ballads, and Sparky's original compositions. See them live February 3 at Noon in KC F-128; February 4 at 12:30pm in the SC Wilson Center; and February 5 at Noon in the NC auditorium.

Nurse Without Boundaries



After working as a nurse in emergency rooms throughout the United States, Mary Lightfine, a self professed adrenaline junkie, decided to join an organization called Doctors without Borders. That decision changed her life. Since then, she's lived in more than a dozen countries, including some of the most hellish spots on Earth: Uganda, Somalia, Liberia, Sri Lanka, Pakistan, Nicaragua, Macedonia, and most recently, South Sudan and Afghanistan.

Mary's personal stories will amaze you. She has lived through the anarchy of Mogadishu: "A friend of mine was assassinated; I was shot at!" In Sudan, "I was forced to step over the dead bodies of famine victims so that I could supervise the feedings of

hundreds of malnourished and dehydrated children a day. Dozens died before my eyes." In Nicaragua, she was the on-line correspondent for ABC International News and aided relief efforts for victims of Hurricane Mitch. She worked the Kosovo refugee camps: "ten day old bullet wounds, people who have not slept for a month because of the horrible things they saw." Her lecture will give you the human story behind the news articles. Mary has been seen in *Life Magazine* and on ABC News, NBC News, CNN and the History Channel. Flemming on Leadership

Sheila Flemming, Ph.D., is a fifth-generation Floridian, Executive Assistant to the President for the College Centennial, and Professor of History and Chair of the Social Sciences Division at Bethune-Cookman College (B-CC). A graduate of Bethune-Cookman College, Atlanta University and Howard University, she is author of *Bethune-Cookman College 1904-1994: The Answered Prayer To A Dream* and an article in the volume *Civil Rights in The United States*, among other pieces on B-CC and Mrs. Bethune. And through all that, she still finds the time to talk with college students about leadership.

Recently an American Council on Education Fellow at Spelman College in Atlanta, Dr. Flemming has served as scholar/historian/lecturer for several women's and children's conferences. She is Lay Leader at Stewart Memorial United Methodist Church (Daytona Beach); a member of the Board of Directors of the Florida Humanities Council; and the Vice Chair of the National Park Service Advisory Commission for the Mary McLeod Bethune National Council House Historic Site, Washington, DC. She's a children's advocate with local, state and national service to organizations advocating for the rights of children and a Fulbright scholar, with research and teaching interests in the history of black higher education, African and African American history, with special emphasis on women and race relations. She is a global citizen having traveled to every continent in the world except Australia.

As the March keynote for the Leadership 'n' Life lecture series, Dr. Flemming will present a dynamic and informative program about following the path to public service, and the qualities and skills necessary to succeed, March 25 at 11am in the NC auditorium and at 1pm in the SC Wilson Center; and March 26 at Noon in KC G-121.

Shana Smith

Nashville Scene describes Shana as "a cross between Joan Armatrading, Cassandra Wilson, and the jazzy excursions of Joni Mitchell." Ft. Lauderdale's City Link Magazine remarks that she "sings with sophistication and style, calling into mind Pat Benatar-rock at one moment, and at another the keening of a Scottish lament." Listen.com said: "This versatile singer-songwriter can croon her way through smoky, late-night lounge jazz, or soar over uplifting, hand-clapping acoustic folk-rock." Call it folk, jazz, or blues, Tampa Bay-based Shana Smith is one dynamic singer/songwriter. She performs nationwide, including venues such as the Olympic Village in Atlanta, the White House, the Seattle Center, Florida Seminole Indian reservations, and at colleges across the U.S.

Writing and singing original songs is her first love, but Shana also performs a range of cover material, from contemporary artists to classic standards. She is equally appropriate for and comfortable at a fine arts event, a college cafeteria, a folk festival, or a late-night blues joint. She performs as a solo artist, but also works with some "killer" musicians in duo, trio, or full band combinations. "Just give me a mic and a place to sing. I'll bring the guitar and, if you want, a whole band. We can lose ourselves to music for the next one, two, three, four hours." 

Graduation—the completion of all requirements necessary for your academic program.

Commencement—the formal ceremony at which degrees or certificates are conferred, held at the end of spring term.

Honors—graduating with an all-college cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.5-3.74.

High Honors—graduating with an all-college cumulative GPA of 3.75 or higher.

Since the commencement program is printed before spring term grades are recorded, honor graduates are identified based on their GPA at the beginning of spring term.

Rehearsal-forget it; we don't have one!

Now the basic facts...

When—college credit commencement is Saturday, May 10, 11am. Adult High School and GED commencement is Saturday, May 10, 3pm. Information about when to report for the ceremony and how to confirm your attendance will be mailed to graduates' homes in early April. Where—Veteran's Memorial Coliseum, 1145 E. Adams Street.

Who—anyone may participate who has graduated at the end of Summer Term '02, Fall Term '02 or Spring Term '03.

Caps and Gowns—available for purchase in your campus bookstore in April.

Graduation Annoucements—available from the campus bookstore in March. Neither announcements nor tickets are required for admission to the coliseum. Your family and friends are welcome to attend the ceremony.

Graduation Photos–official photographers will take your picture as you cross the stage and a proof will be mailed to you. Photo purchase information will be included with the proof if you wish to buy copies.
