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Trinidad Tripoli Steel Band

Warm up with a little steel and reggae! From Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, to a world tour, this amazing group of performers plays a repertoire of music that ranges from classical to rock and roll...on oil drums. This feat has astounded audiences not only because of its oil drums, but also because of the unbelievable fidelity and artistic accomplishments with which they render each concert or dance, whether it be modern, classical or their native reggae Calypso.

Born from the desperate days following World War II when it was not possible to get their instruments or money to play their Calypso music, the natives of Trinidad discovered that abandoned oil drums could be used for musical tones. Thus began the original steel drum band, and now Trinidad Tripoli has taken the stage in Rockfeller Plaza, Central Park and the Lincoln Center in New York City, as well as stages around the world. Ruckers Tell an African American Story

Internationally acclaimed James "Sparky" Rucker is recognized as a leading folklorist, historian, musician, storyteller, and author who has been singing songs and telling stories from the American tradition for over 35 years. Accompanying Sparky is his wife Rhonda, who practiced medicine for five years before becoming a full-time folk musician. She is a versatile performer, playing blues harmonica, piano, banjo, and creating wonderful vocal harmonies.

Sparky has appeared on numerous radio programs, including National Public Radio's Morning Edition, Prairie Home Companion, and Mountain Stage. He also performed in Carry it On and Amazing Grace: Music in America, two videos produced by the Public Broadcasting System. The Ruckers' 1991 audio release, Treasures & Tears, was nominated for the W.C. Handy Award for Best Traditional Recording; they contributed music to the television miniseries The Wild West; and their unique renditions of John Henry and Jesse James were used in National Geographic's 1994 media project entitled Storytelling in North America.

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"The Acorn and the Peanut"

The son of Jamaican parents, Joseph "Joe Tap" Tapper spent his early childhood in Jamaica, New York, Florida, Arizona, and southern California. His family settled in San Bernardino, where Tap entered the fourth grade and became interested in playing the cornet. Blessed with the ability to play by ear, Tap continued to play the cornet while pursuing his secondary education in Phoenix, but while working his way through school, Tap was robbed and kidnapped. Following this harrowing experience, he joined the Air Force, which led him to Denver, Colorado. There Tap met saxophonist/mentor Elmus High, who inspired him to take up the instrument. Tap purchased a saxophone from a pawn shop and found that he could play both instruments equally well, but he gave up the cornet to focus his artistic abilities on the saxophone and is currently highly regarded within the gospel music scene. Following his father's calling as preacher, Tap began speaking to audiences about his life experiences. By combining his passion of playing music and inspirational speaking, Tap has developed several powerful presentations. Sean Smith



With his skillful artistry and musical style, Sean Smith has captivated the ears and minds of audiences across America. He has subsequently shared the stage with folk sensations such as Leo Kottke, Jack Williams, Lucy Kaplansky, and folk/pop superstar John Mayer. Sean's musical career stems from his love of writing and acoustic music. After attending the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, and a tour in the United States Air Force, Smith confronted social issues like growing up in a racist environment. In songs like "Pledge Allegiance," and "The Way of This Place", Smith helps us to explore the human condition and reach a peaceable resolve through education, effort, and love. Mark "Muddy Harp" Hodgson

Born in Detroit and raised in Daytona Beach, Mark "Muddy Harp" Hodgson has performed professionally for the last 27 years, starting on harmonica and vocals and eventually picking up acoustic fingerstyle. His first attempt at blues came around 1970 when Leroy Carr's "How Long Blues" became the first blues song he performed live. Since those humble beginnings, Mark has performed in concert with the likes of B.B. King, Buddy Guy, John Mayall, James Cotten, Kenny Wayne Shepard, Leon Russell, Johnny Winter, and scores of others. He also performs regularly at the House of Blues. 

Bearing an uncanny resemblance to Poe and able to recite four hours of the poet's work from memory, Keltz's presentation is a factual and entertaining visit to Poe's world. Keltz has portrayed Poe since 1992, visiting schools, universities, dinner theatres and more. He has also performed at the Baltimore Poe House and Museum, Poe Museum in Richmond, Poe National Historic Site in Philadelphia, the Smithsonian

You will hear the "Untold Story" and share prize-winning photo essays of subjects from the late President Nixon to MotherTeresa, spanning the globe from The Great Wall of China to Machu Pichu. For nearly 35 years, the Florida Community College Artist Series has been bringing dazzling Broadway shows and exciting theater to Jacksonville. This year's schedule promises the same.
