Dental Hygiene Graduates Earn Impressive National Exam Ranking

Our 2016 Dental Hygiene graduates achieved outstanding results on the National Board Dental Hygiene Examination (NBDHE), earning a 100 percent pass rate and scoring in the 90th percentile in the nation!

The computerized, comprehensive exam is required for licensure in all 50 states. It assesses the ability of the student to understand important information from basic biomedical, dental and dental hygiene sciences, as well as the ability to apply such information in a problem-solving context. Our graduates continued to impress with a 91 percent success rate on the ADEX clinical licensing examination, also a requirement for state licensure.

The Dental Hygiene program is a limited access, 20-month program located at North Campus. The bulk of the students' clinical education takes place in the Dental Hygiene Clinic, where patients from the community receive oral hygiene services from students under the supervision of licensed dentists and dental hygienists.

We're immensely proud of the success our Dental Hygiene graduates have achieved and we're confident our program will continue to excel on a national level. Congratulations to our graduates!

Dr. Chris Holland Named Distinguished Alumnus



We'd like to congratulate Vice President of Student Services Dr. Chris Holland, who was recently honored by Jamestown Community College (JCC) with the 2016 Distinguished Alumnus Award. It is the highest honor presented by the JCC Alumni Association.

The 1993 liberal arts graduate was awarded at the College's Commencement exercises in New York on May 20. Of approximately 21,000 alumni, Dr. Holland joins a select group of only 93 other JCC graduates who have been named Distinguished Alumni. The award honors those who have exemplified JCC's tradition of excellence and brought credit to the College through personal accomplishment, professional achievement or humanitarian service.

Dr. Holland has dedicated his professional life to working with youth. He has volunteered with Big Brother, Big Sister programs in Florida, Montana, Mississippi and New York. He has also mentored youth in six states, most recently as a tutor and counselor for Upward Bound programs. He has lectured widely on diversity, gender and sexuality

as well as the experiences of underrepresented student groups.

After graduating from JCC, Dr. Holland went on to earn a bachelor's and master's degree in English from the State University of New York (SUNY) at Fredonia and later earned a master's degree in higher education administration from the University at Albany, SUNY. He also holds a doctorate degree in higher education administration from the University of Alabama (UA).

We are extremely fortunate to have Dr. Holland leading our Student Services and sharing his knowledge and expertise with our faculty, staff and students.

Faculty Spotlight

Faculty-to-Faculty Spotlight

FSCJ has the best and brightest faculty who are committed to providing meaningful and rewarding educational experiences for our students.

To continue the 2015-16 theme of "engagement," Dr. Angela Browning is highlighting the extraordinary work of a faculty member each month to share his/her teaching and engagement techniques, professional development, community service and unique College contributions.

This month's column highlights the work of Dr. Carl Colavito, professor of political science and philosophy at Kent Campus.

Engaging with and supporting students:

- Dr. Colavito, while making certain to teach his subject, focuses on students and their development. He uses the material of his classes as a medium through which he can connect with students and help them recognize and then achieve their potential.
- "Future You" – This is the message that Professor Colavito imparts to students at the beginning of his courses. He uses this concept to introduce his students to the idea that they are always changing – at any time in their life they are not the same person they were before that moment nor will they be the same person after that

moment. School, then, is a perfect time for them to go work on the development of themselves. During college, they are training to be the best version of themselves and Professor Colavito tries through his lectures and coursework to help them gain internal discipline. - Using the principles of Socratic dialogue, Dr. Colavito endeavors to promote real, engaged discussions about difficult topics by helping his students disassociate their egos and selves from the ideas they say. For example, in one course he might ask students to pose their questions about race by asking them to write them on an index card. Those index cards are then taken to another class where students are asked to find answers to the questions posed. A discussion can ensue without any connection of the question with a specific classmate.



Reimagining how students interact with class concepts:

- Active Learning - Professor Colavito creates an active learning environment that encourages students' interaction with class material and ideas. For example, in a course he might have students prepare and present a court case. Students play the following roles: lawyers, witnesses, jury members, judge, bailiff, court reporter, etc. This is an effort on Dr. Colavito's part to put students in the active seats they will fill when they leave the classroom. While some students are not immediately open to and appreciative of this "out of the ordinary" classroom experience, Professor Colavito has noticed that they look back on the experience as one that becomes fun; one that helps them learn not just the material, but the importance of being well-prepared.
- "What is Honor" - This event is an example of Dr. Colavito's efforts and engagement. The event was supported by the Philosophy Club he sponsors and was billed as a "full-filled evening of food, art, and a Socratic dialogue on the theme of honor." The event included a buffet table and an opportunity for students to peruse the art gallery that had images of honor, definitions of honor, and questions about honor displayed. Performances that included a brief enactment of a scene from "To Kill a Mockingbird" (directed by Professor Harolyn Sharpe with FSCJ students as cast members) and a reading from Shakespeare's "King Henry V" (performed by Professor Mark Creegan) followed. A member of UNF's Philosophy Club gave a presentation entitled "Honor: The Pragmatics of Bridging from Is to Ought" followed by a Socratic discussion about Honor moderated by Professor Colavito.
- Masquerade Ball and the 70s Dance - these events incorporated active learning, arts and crafts, dance, and socializing to demonstrate that learning takes different forms and can be fun. Student engagement and community building are priorities for Dr. Colavito since he sees them as integral to the cultivation and development of the student as a full human being.
- Kent Talks - Kent Talks are events hosted by the two clubs that Professor Colavito sponsors, Politics and Rational Discourse Club (PARDI), and the Philosophy Club. They are designed to introduce contemporary social or political issues to an audience to stimulate active citizenship through rational discourse. For example, this spring there were three talks: "Clash of Civilizations," "Reasons People Go to War or Commit Genocide," and "Criteria for Intervening in War or Genocide." A fourth talk combines the panelists from the three previous discussions as a way of concluding the discussion.

FSCJ Faculty and Staff Member Honored with Innovation of the Year Awards

Professor Rawlslyn Francis and Kent Campus Dual Enrollment Coordinator Naita Guine were named Innovation of the Year Award winners for FSCJ's Innovative Approach to High School Student Outreach. Professor Francis and Ms. Guine were selected to receive the honor because of their respective dedication to two key initiatives.

Professor Francis leads the annual Student Life Skills (SLS) conference with the purpose of inspiring and engaging college and high school students enrolled in FSCJ's SLS courses. Launched in 2013, the annual two-day conference showcases motivational speakers and alumni success stories, informs students of valuable College resources and shares best practices in psychological educational methods and techniques. On average, 300 students attend each year and gain useful skills and tools to help them achieve their goals.

Ms. Guine directed a Youth Research for Action high school dual enrollment project titled "Stress Among Dual Enrollment Students: Thriving or Surviving?" Funded by a grant from the What Kids Can Do Foundation, a core group of students conducted focus groups and surveys to examine the stress level of 400 high school dual enrollment participants and measure its impact. At project completion, the student researchers compiled their results into a paper and a compelling video which highlighted their findings. The top five causes of stress reported by participants were workload, family expectations, uncertainty of the future, demands of balancing extracurricular activities and application deadlines. Most students reported that the key to managing their stress is finding a strong support system in family, friends and mentors. Following a dual enrollment alumni focus group, student

researchers concluded it is worth the time commitment and associated stress to become better prepared for the future through the dual enrollment program.

The League for Innovation established the Innovation of the Year awards program more than 30 years ago as a way to recognize significant innovations that help improve the ability of institutions to serve students and the community.

To honor both Professor Francis and Ms. Guine, Dr. Bioteau presented them with framed certificates for their achievements at the June Board of Trustees meeting.

Ginny Alexander Hired as New Interim Director of Athletics



The College welcomes Head BlueWave Volleyball Coach Ginny Alexander to her new role as interim director of athletics. Ginny began her career in college athletics in 1988 as a graduate assistant coach and worked her way to becoming a National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I (DI) head volleyball coach.

In 1999, she created and implemented the NCAA Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success (CHAMPS) Life Skills program at San Diego State University for more than 500 student athletes. She went on to create two more CHAMPS life skills programs at Converse College as well as Brevard College, where she served as assistant athletic director for compliance and academic services and senior woman administrator.

In 2011, Ginny returned to Jacksonville and worked as the director of membership, regional director and training coach at Jacksonville Junior Volleyball Association. The Atlantic Beach native also served as a high school health and physical education teacher. From 2001 to 2006, she spent time as

the director of programs for the Jacksonville Police Athletic League where she worked with both civilian and sworn employees, running athletic- and academic-based programs for at-risk youth.

Ginny also is a member of the Community Coaches Program through the Northeast Florida Nonprofit Center, which assists not-for-profit organizations in strategic planning and sustainability.

The Fletcher High School graduate was a three-sport athlete and member of Fletcher's State Championship softball and volleyball teams. Ginny also played volleyball and softball for one year at Lake City Community College (LCCC), now Florida Gateway College, for Coach Jean Williams. She then transferred on to the University of Alabama-Birmingham to play NCAA D1 volleyball for Hall of Fame Coach Brenda Williams.

It was there that she earned her Bachelor of Science (B.S.) in Social and Behavioral Sciences. She later completed her master's in Education (Health, Physical Education and Recreation) from Bowling Green State University while coaching the men's volleyball team.

Ginny lives in Fernandina Beach, where she enjoys fishing, kayaking and golfing.

FSCJ Recognizes Distinguished Alumnus' Contributions

Jim Marlier was recently recognized as FSCJ's first Distinguished Alumnus for his esteemed accomplishments and exceptional contributions to his profession and our community, as well as his outstanding support of FSCJ. Jim was honored at the 2016 Commencement Ceremony where he was formally recognized and presented with an award by President Bioteau.

As one of our first students, Jim began his college career at what was then Florida Junior College. He graduated as a member of the second graduating class in 1969 with an Associate in Arts. He later earned a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Florida (UF) in 1971.

After completing his undergraduate work at UF, Jim began his professional career as an instructor at Ribault High School where he taught for five years. During that time, he continued his education at the University of North Florida (UNF), where he completed a master's degree in education in 1976.

Later that year, Jim moved on to GT Leasing, an automotive leasing company and one of the oldest commercial leasing companies in the country. He serves as the company's board chairman. During his time with GT Leasing, he has served as the chairman of the National Vehicle Leasing Association's (NVLA) Florida Chapter from 1996-2000, and also the NVLA's National Board of Directors from 1996-97.

Jim has also been very involved with the community over the years, serving as a member of the FSCJ Foundation Board of Directors from 2004-11 and the board chairman in 2011. He served as tournament chairman in 1989 for The Players Championship and as captain of past chairmen from 2003-05. Psychology Graduate Gives Back as Student Success Intern

He highlights his experiences in Professor Dana Kuehn's psychology classes as being beneficial to his growth as a student and a person. Michael earned a leadership award from Professor Kuehn.

"It was pretty powerful to have her as an instructor," he said. "I think people were afraid to share what they were really feeling, but in psychology class, it's not going to be any fun if we don't share how we feel about a particular situation. And she really embraced that."

Michael says his FSCJ experience as a whole taught him the value of diversity and he appreciates the College's willingness to welcome and support students of all backgrounds. "What really helped me receive that leadership award is that I wasn't afraid to just be myself," he said. "This college just really embraces us to be who you are."
