## FSCJ Joins Achieving the Dream Network to Improve Student Success

FSCJ was selected to join Achieving the Dream (ATD), an exclusive, national community college network dedicated to improving student success. Acting as a catalyst to support and strengthen colleges, ATD helps to ensure that more students complete postsecondary education, giving them a greater opportunity for economic success. The capacity-building framework and companion self-assessment allow member colleges to pinpoint strengths and opportunities for improvement across key institutional areas such as leadership and vision, teaching and learning and data and technology.

As one of more than 200 community colleges throughout the country to be chosen for membership, FSCJ will benefit from ATD's decade of experience, network collaboration and mentorship to help build proficiencies, deepen our ability to collect and analyze data, construct strategic partnerships, align student success efforts – with specific interest on low-income students and students of color – and support change in identified areas of need. The results will include higher retention and completion rates as well as closure of achievement gaps.

Last month, Dr. John Woodward, Dr. Carrie Henderson, Dr. Marie Gnage, Dr. Chris Holland, Dr. John Wall and Dr. Angela Browning represented FSCJ at the ATD Cohort Kickoff Institute in Scottsdale, Arizona. They joined 11 other kickoff teams from colleges across the nation to collectively and collaboratively develop processes for transformative institutional improvement. Working alongside ATD leadership and data coaches, teams analyzed their respective college's strengths, challenges and opportunities for advancement.

"Our inclusion in this program will better organize our existing efforts while continuing to keep our students at the forefront of all conversations," said Dr. Chris Holland, vice president of student services. "ATD will assist us in transforming the way we serve our students around continuous improvement and focusing our efforts on their success. ### **Remember to Download Our Mobile Safety App-FSCJ Safe**

We want to ensure that everyone on our campuses feels safe at all times. That's why we'd like to remind all faculty and staff to download the FSCJ Safe App, available for free on Apple and Android devices. The app, which offers real-time safety functions and features, is currently only available to employees.

However, we expect to introduce the app to students during the Fall Term. We encourage all employees to begin using this app and take full advantage of its features, which include:

- The Mobile BlueLight function which allows you to send your location to and chat with campus security dispatch as you walk. It works similarly to the fixed positioned BlueLight boxes located throughout campus
- The ability to send your location in real-time to a friend or campus security so they can watch you walk to your destination and signal for help if needed
- The option to call 911 and find security office phone numbers for our campuses and centers as well as the number for JSO and the Nassau County Sheriff's Office
- The Safety Toolbox which features a flashlight tool, a loud alarm and more
- Information on emergency plans, helpful resources, campus maps and an option to report a tip if you witness an incident on campus

### **FSCJ to use Open Educational Resources in Degree Programs to Raise College Completion Rates**

FSCJ is one of only two colleges in the state to be awarded a grant to create degree programs using high-quality Open Educational Resources (OER). The initiative, which involves 38 community colleges in 13 states, is designed to help remove financial roadblocks that can derail students' progress and spur improvements that will increase the likelihood of college completion.

A full-time community college student spends about \$1,300 per year on textbooks – roughly a third of the cost of an associate degree. Research shows this cost is a significant barrier to college completion. The OER Degree initiative will create a library of digital, open courses available to other institutions and the public.

Using digital and interactive OERs such as open courseware allows our faculty to continue to teach our students in engaging and dynamic ways and encourages students to become more actively involved in their own learning.

The initiative's requirement to create entire degree programs using OER also will trigger a careful re-examination of course content and sequencing to build up-to-date, cohesive degree programs. By the end of the grant, we expect to roll out an Associate in Arts (A.A.) in General Studies and an Associate in Science (A.S.) in Human Services in an OER format.

Achieving the Dream (ATD), a national nonprofit community college reform network, is managing the new OER Degree initiative on behalf of a consortium of investors that includes the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, the Great Lakes Higher Education Guaranty Corporation, the Shelter Hill Foundation and the Speedwell Foundation.

When the initiative is completed, all approved OER courses will be available through a comprehensive, easily accessible online platform to encourage OER adoption even at non-participating institutions.

## **Community Participates in North Campus Health Literacy Fair**

Thanks to everyone who participated, last month's North Campus Health Literacy Fair was a huge success. More than 70 people from the College and community took advantage of the free health-related information, education and resources available on June 11, 2016.

The Health Literacy Fair kicked off with a wellness walk. Health education sessions were provided throughout the day on sexually transmitted diseases, sports rehabilitation and physical therapy, falls prevention and dynamic stretching. Attendees also had the opportunity to learn about the Affordable Care Act from Florida Blue representatives.



Many community partners supported the event including Mayo Clinic, Brooks Rehabilitation and Vision is Priceless. Students were able to engage with the community by assisting with blood donations and oral health screenings. The nursing programs and all allied health programs at the College also participated.

Interpreters from FSCJ's Sign Language Interpretation Program (SLIP) helped make the Health Literacy Fair more accessible by being on hand for the local hearing-impaired community. "All 12 of us found this event extremely beneficial on so many levels," said Instructional Program Manager Lori Cimino. "We took the opportunity to work one-on-one with students using authentic examples of interpreting for them to develop their skills."

Executive Chair for the School of Social, Behavioral and Health Sciences/North Campus President Dr. Sandy Robinson said she feels that this event has positively impacted the lives of the attendees. ### CJC Cadet Academy Recruiting Law Enforcement Training Applicants for Fall Term

Continued demand for public safety will lead to new openings for workers in local and state departments. FSCJ's Northeast Florida Criminal Justice Center (CJC) is answering that call with the Cadet program. The program is now accepting applications for the upcoming Fall Term.

Recognized as one of the best facilities for law enforcement and security training, the CJC at FSCJ's North Campus is equipped with optimal classroom and tactical training environments, fully preparing students for a future in law enforcement.

The Cadet program is geared toward recent high school graduates with an interest in law enforcement. These students can simultaneously earn an Associate in Science (A.S.) degree in Criminal Justice Technology and complete the Florida Law Enforcement Basic Recruit Training program in approximately two years.

Through rigorous academic coursework, law enforcement training and ongoing mentoring, program graduates will be distinctly equipped for employment as law enforcement officers in the state of Florida.

Upon completing the training program, students are required to pass the state certification exam, upon which they will receive 18 credit hours needed to complete the A.S. degree.

## Student Spotlight

### Adult Education Graduate Overcomes Obstacles

We appreciate and embrace the diversity in our students and understand that each of them has traveled many different paths on their individual journeys to academic success. It is their determination to succeed which makes their triumphs all the more inspiring.

Claudius (Claude) Anderson, a recent graduate of FSCJ's Adult Education program, exemplifies what one can achieve with fortitude and encouraging leadership. Claude comes from a troubled background, including dropping out of high school, serving prison time and being a victim of gun violence. The Trinidad and Tobago native fell into street culture at an early age when his family relocated.

"Fighting, assault, disorderly conduct, getting locked up," Claude reflected. "I did a lot of stupidity when I was growing up. I couldn't stay out of jail."

For a 20-year period, Claude continued down this road but expressed a desire to change. "I tried to get back on track with school. I tried different programs, but they didn't help me like they do down here at FSCJ," he said. "I was really scared of the GED. My mind wasn't in it."

Soon after, he spent three years in a Florida prison. Upon his release in 2014, Claude decided it was time to turn his life around. He moved to Jacksonville on the advice of a friend and finally summoned the courage to take the GED test at FSCJ. With the help of Edward Thomas Jr., an adjunct professor and academic tutor at Downtown Campus, Claude was able to achieve his goal.

"He came in and listened to what I said, trusted me to help him get his GED," said Professor Thomas. "The young man came every day I was here. We went through his subjects together. He was always right there. It was a tribute to him and his dedication."

Claude credits moving to Jacksonville and tutoring from Professor Thomas with getting him on the right track. "Right now I feel like there's nothing I can't learn," he said. "Whatever I want to learn, I can learn."

Claude plans to attend college to pursue environmental science in the future. We are immensely proud of what Claude has achieved. His dedication and Professor Thomas' guidance are a shining example of what our amazing students and faculty can accomplish together.

### FSCJ BlueWave Baseball Earns NJCAA Award for Academics

FSCJ BlueWave Baseball was honored by the National Junior College Athletic Association with the 2015-16 Academic Honorable Mention Team Award.

In addition to their fourth-place ranking in conference play for the competitive season, the BlueWave baseball team cumulatively held a 3.27 grade point average at the close of the academic year, earning them second place in Florida and 18th in the nation.

Head Coach Brad Frick attributes much of the players' academic success to the "student-first" mentality he and his coaching staff instill from the start of their FSCJ career.

"I'm very proud of these young men and the example they have set for a successful college athletic program," said Coach Frick. "Our players are great competitors not only on the field, but in the classroom as well."

## Health and Wellness

### **FSCJ Joins Forces with the American Cancer Society to Increase Colorectal Cancer Screening Rates**

To help progress the overall wellbeing of our community, we at FSCJ feel strongly about supporting various initiatives – extending beyond educational advancement – that bring opportunities for holistic growth, awareness and improvement.

As such, we are partnering with employers throughout the nation in support of the 80 percent by 2018 employer challenge initiative, led by the American Cancer Society (ACS), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable (NCCRT). The College is one of the first institutions in the nation to sign the pledge.

Despite being highly preventable, detectable and treatable, colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in the United States. While incidence rates have dropped in the U.S. among adults 50 and older, an estimated 134,490 new cases will be diagnosed in 2016.

Through this NCCRT initiative, hundreds of organizations including FSCJ have committed to substantially reducing colorectal cancer as a major public health problem. The partnership is working toward the shared goal of increasing the percentage of adults age 50 and older who have regular screenings to 80 percent by 2018. If achieved, 277,000 cases and 203,000 colorectal cancer deaths would be prevented by 2030.

"On behalf of FSCJ, I would like to pledge our support as a partner in the 80 percent by 2018 effort and I hope you will consider doing the same," Executive Chair for the School of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics/Downtown Campus President Dr. Marie Gnage said as she helped kick off the Metro Jacksonville Relay for Life in April of this year. "Working together, we can achieve this goal and save more lives."

Leveraging the energy of multiple and diverse participants, 80 percent by 2018 partners seek to empower communities, patients and providers to increase screening rates among employees and their families. Along with health systems, health care providers, businesses, government agencies, nonprofit organizations and patient advocacy groups, FSCJ has committed to getting more people screened to prevent colorectal cancer and promote early detection, when it is most treatable.

To align ourselves with the American Cancer Society, we will develop a communications strategy through which we will provide information and educational opportunities for our faculty and staff to create a heightened awareness of the matter. In addition, we plan to stress the importance of seeking recommended preventative cancer screenings, not limited to those 50 and up, but for all demographic groups across our College.
