<u>Pathways to Work Momentum</u> <u>Continues</u>

FSCJ's latest workforce training initiative was formally introduced to the public during a press conference held on June 15 at Downtown Campus. FSCJ President Dr. Cynthia Bioteau introduced the innovative program and its purpose to prepare and place students in entry-level high-demand occupations in Construction/Trades, Culinary Arts and Global Logistics industries.

Utilizing existing outreach programs at Andrew Jackson and William M. Raines high schools and A. Philip Randolph Career Academies, Pathways to Work identified 60 Duval County high school rising seniors, who are generally at risk for graduation and consequently, have limited opportunity to attain "living wage" employment.

Also in attendance was Duval County Public Schools Director of High School Acceleration Programs Wendy Dunlap, The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida President Nina Waters and three Pathways to Work students representing each of the schools and industry tracks, Barry Jinks, Priscilla Bosket and San-tee Elkridge.

William M. Raines Student Barry Jinks said, "In the past week I've participated in this program, it has opened my eyes. The bridge to college will be a simple one to cross with the work they are helping us with here."

On Wednesday, June 21, high school students in FSCJ's Pathways to Work program had the opportunity to participate in simulated real-life financial decisions and budgeting through an event hosted by First Florida Credit Union. Students were assigned careers, salaries and played the role of parents and spouses. Visiting simulation booths, First Florida Credit Union representatives worked one-on-one with students to help them tally expenses and work to stay within their set budgets.

FSCJ Partners With Local Health Care Institutions in Career Advancement Program

FSCJ's Surgical Technology Workforce Certificate program has created a unique partnership with Baptist Health and Memorial Hospital to train incumbent hospital workers to become surgical technologists. Through this partnership, 12 hospital workers who currently hold positions in various departments at the hospitals, including billing and insurance clerks, floor technicians and nursing assistants will receive hands-on training.

The student employees will receive instruction on anatomy and physiology, medical terminology, microbiology, pharmacology and anesthesia. They will also be trained to create and maintain the necessary sterile environment for surgical procedures. In addition, the students will be able to maintain their full-time position within the hospital along with their full pay and benefits.

Upon completion, the students will earn their certification and be promoted within their facility to begin earning a higher income and thus more stability for their future.

This partnership addresses the shortage of well-qualified, certified surgical technologists within the local community. The effort was led by Dr. Neal Henning, dean of health sciences, Dr. Monica Franklin, academic director of health sciences, Ms. Shannon Baum, with Baptist Health and Mr. Scott Brown, with Memorial

Hospital.

The first cohort of 12 students began in October 2016 and will complete the program this October. A second cohort of 12 Baptist Health and Memorial Hospital incumbent workers will begin the surgical technology program in November 2017.

FSCJ Hosts Health-Up Event for Community



On June 10, FSCJ partnered with Healthy Jacksonville Men's Health Coalition to host Health-Up, a family and fitness day where health education and activities were available for all ages at the North Campus. FSCJ students and members from the community volunteered their time help make the event a success.

The day kicked off with a family health walk in the morning. Throughout the day, 30 local community agencies provided information and resources on healthy living and offered free

physicals and dental cleanings for children. Students from FSCJ's cosmetology, massage therapy and facials programs were also available to provide services free of charge to the 200 in attendance.

"This was a wonderful opportunity for collaboration between students, FSCJ employees and the community, and we look forward to increasing these experiences for our students and the community in the future," said Academic Director of Health Sciences Dr. Monica Franklin.

Vetrepreneur Event Prepares Aspiring Business Owners



FSCJ's Military and Veterans Service Center partnered with the City of Jacksonville Military Affairs and Veterans Department to host a summit for Veteran entrepreneurs on June 14. With the understanding that the transition from military life to civilian life can be difficult, this summit was developed to help guide Veterans on starting their own businesses or making their current business more successful.

Hundreds of participants gathered at FSCJ's Advanced Technology

Center to hear from a panel of business owners from different military branches and Veteran resource officials about best practices for new companies. More than 15 vendors, including government organizations, were on

hand to provide valuable resources and share helpful information to attendees. Additionally, the event was streamed live and had more than 19,000 views from across the nation.

Project Coordinator for Military and Veterans Service Center Chris Johnson said, "The Vetrepreneur Summit was a big success. This event should empower local Veterans to achieve their dream of being a business owner which will in turn help the community grow."

FSCJ Receives Bank of America Grant for Cybersecurity Career Training

FSCJ was recently awarded a \$10,000 Economic Mobility Grant from the Bank of America Charitable Foundation to prepare students for meaningful employment and support the College's capacity to deliver practical cybersecurity education.

The majority of the funds will be used to build a more robust paid internship experience for 20 students in the Associate in Science in IT Security program during the 2017-18 academic year which will enhance the College's overall workforce development initiatives, while also addressing the community's shortage of highly skilled cybersecurity professionals.

In partnership with the Northeast Florida Regional STEM²Hub, Jacksonville's Museum of Science and History (MOSH) and Brunet-García Advertising Agency, the remaining funds will support the development and implementation of an interactive, educational exhibit with the purpose of raising awareness of cybersecurity issues and informing youth about the field.

As cyberattacks have become more frequent, sophisticated and financially damaging, the demand for experienced and proficient cybersecurity professionals has grown significantly. According to economic modeling data from Emsi for Duval and Nassau counties, Florida universities and state colleges are not producing enough graduates to fulfill the need. In fact, for every new IT security student graduating within the region, there are nine open positions waiting to be filled in northeast Florida.

"We are grateful to the Bank of America Charitable Foundation for partnering with us in our efforts to support our students and the entire community through workforce development initiatives," said Dean of Career Education Dr. Mamdouh Babi. "Their generosity directly impacts our students' learning and employment opportunities and, at a time when cyber activity is both an economic engine and a national security concern, aids in closing the talent gap."


Through the grant, Bank of America continues their focus on the economic mobility of individuals and families by investing in workforce development and education to address basic and prevalent needs.



A Day in the Life of an International Student

Lynn Dollekamp is a 24-year-old international student, whom recently graduated from Florida State College at Jacksonville with a bachelor's degree in Converged Communications. Dollekamp, born and raised in the Netherlands, is first born out of three children. She is an all-star athlete who was on the winning team of the European Softball Championships in Italy when she was 17. With the love from her devoted parents, Dollekamp went on to play for the Dutch National softball team where she was approached to play at FSCJ with a full scholarship. In 2012, after much consideration, Dollekamp traveled to Jacksonville, FL to attend school, work and play softball, with full support from her family back in the Netherlands.



"Playing softball in America has been one of my biggest dreams because softball, sports and athletics in general is a lot more popular in America. So I thought that this was the perfect opportunity to grow as a person and also as a softball player," Dollekamp said.

A Whole New World...

Traveling so far from home to a new country, with no personal connections, had to be hard on Dollekamp. She admitted that the language barrier between herself and those around her was an obstacle to overcome. Dollekamp expressed having difficulty when writing papers for her classes because she "thought in Dutch and then translated to English."

"It was really hard for me to adapt to the language when I first got to school here," confessed Dollekamp.

Although expressing to have trouble with the language barrier, her writing only showed a few grammar errors that, according to her professor Dr. Claire Rhodes, went away after time.

"Lynn is probably one of the best students at multi-tasking and time management. Not only was she always prepared, but she was kind of freakishly early about everything. There was not a large assignment that she did not send me a draft for at least like 3 weeks in advance...Lynn is terrific!" Rhodes said.
