INTRODUCTION

To address the needs of the residents of Duval and Nassau Counties, the College has three principal sources of revenue, namely: State appropriation, student fees and external (read federal) funds. This publication delineates the programs and projects funded totally or partially with external funds during the 1978-79 fiscal year.

State appropriations and student fees cannot together support the number and variety of programs needed by the College's service district. Therefore, supplementing external funds are sought and targeted to meet identified needs. External funds make possible the enrollment of many students for whom financially unassisted attendance is precluded. External funds also finance the initial start-up costs associated with developing programs. Moreover, external funds make possible the provision by the College of programs addressing the needs of non-traditional students. For example, this year with the Screening Center for Handicapped Students the College began a systematic effort to address comprehensively the myriad needs of physically handicapped students.

Looking ahead to the 1979-80 fiscal year, external funds will permit the expansion of a needed service delivery system for physically handicapped students. The focus of the College's efforts respecting intercultural curriculum development will shift from Asia to Latin America with a curriculum consultant from Brazil being in residence during the Fall Term and a curriculum consultant from Venezuela being in residence during the Winter and Spring Terms. The expansion of support services provided to Adult Basic Education students which began this fiscal year will continue next fiscal year. Moreover, the College's

exemplary program for displaced homemakers will expand if an application for a national demonstration grant is favorably received. Given the 1979-80 fiscal year grant applications approved or pending, it is clear that fiscal year 1979-80 will prove to be a year of continuing program service expansion and improvement.

ment agency for at least two years

Project Overview: F.J.C. students receive financial assistance from one or more of the following federal and state student financial aid programs.

1. Basic Educational Opportunity Grant (BEOG) - Students who are eligible based upon family income may receive up to \$1,600 per academic year.
2. Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG) - This program provides assistance for qualified students who have exceptional financial need. The recipient also receives assistance equivalent to the grant in the form of a loan and/or participation in the work-study program.
3. College Work-Study Program (CWSP)- Students with need are provided with part-time employment on or off campus. Such employment is typically fifteen hours per week.

4. National Direct Student Loan Program (NDSL) - Students with need may receive a maximum low-cost loan of \$2,500 for a two-year period. The principal and 3% interest are repayable commencing nine months after graduation or termination of study.
5. Florida Insured Student Loan (FISL) - Students who have been legal residents of Florida for a minimum of one year are eligible for a long-term, low-interest loan. Repayment commences nine months subsequent to the completion of study. The Federally Insured Student Loan (FIL) Program is similar in operation. In both programs, loans are provided by participating banks.
6. Florida Student Assistance Grant (FSAG) - The State Department of Education awards these grants to undergraduate students with documented financial need.

Project Overview: The College provided six weeks of intensive training in English language proficiency and internships in actual departments within the College for four individuals from Kuwait University. At the completion of the program, the students had gained the knowledge and skills necessary to function effectively in the use of the English language. The intent of the Internship Program was to facilitate the development of English language skills, both in composition and in conversation.

Project Overview: The College has provided an Adult Basic Education (ABE) Program since the 1968-69 academic year. Presently, approximately 3,500 different individuals are enrolled in ABE courses offered at 147 sites. The courses range from functional literacy through high school level. In addition to the basic skills instruction, the following services are provided to enrolled students:

- Counseling and assessment
- Auditory/visual screening and speech therapy
- Consumer education
- Job finding skills instruction
- Job placement and follow-up

ABE students include visually, hearing, and mentally impaired persons and individuals (e.g., immigrants and refugees) learning to speak English as a second language.

Project Overview: The project provides 500 unemployed and underemployed ABE students with job-finding skills instruction in seeking and applying for employment suitable to their interests, aptitudes, and abilities. Participating students also are provided labor market information and career counseling.

Within the one-day residency, the production of "The Taming of The Shrew" at the Civic Auditorium, as well as workshops on the aspects of producing Shakespeare and classical theatre were presented on the FJC campuses. All activities were open to the students of the College as well as to the general public.
